



The first author reading night of the Fat Oyster Reading series was enjoyed by an audience of forty this past October. Three authors read and delicious refreshments were prepared and sold by local volunteers. The evening was topped off by an engaging question and answer session.

The Fat Oyster committee has received funding to continue with these author reading nights at the hall throughout 2014. The committee is thrilled to be bringing Sharon Butala and Cornelia Hoogland on February 25.

Sharon Butala has published sixteen books of both fiction and nonfiction as well as numerous articles and essays for magazines and newspapers and has been extensively anthologized. She has also had five plays produced. Her most recent book is *The Girl in Saskatoon: A Meditation on Friendship, Memory and Murder* (HarperCollins, 2008). She has just completed another novel, her seventh, and is beginning a new nonfiction on older women. She is an Officer in the Order of Canada and has received the Saskatchewan Order of Merit as well as the Marian Engel Award, the Kloppenburg Award for her achievement in literature, and numerous other awards and prizes over her thirty-plus years of writing, including three honorary doctorates.

Cornelia Hoogland's writing has been published and performed internationally. Selections from her 6 books of poetry, three chapbooks and her nonfiction have won numerous literary competitions and have been shortlisted for the CBC literary (poetry and nonfiction categories) awards, the Relit awards, and the National Magazine Awards. "Sea Level" was published by Baseline Books this fall. Cornelia's play, *Red*, had its Canadian premiere in May 2013 (Fountainhead Theatre, London, Ontario). *Gravelly Bay* was published by Alfred Gustav Press in 2012, *Woods Wolf Girl* by Wolsak and Wynn in 2011, *Crow* by Black Moss Press the same year. Cornelia is Professor Emeritus of Western University and lives on Hornby Island, British Columbia.

The Garden in January

Oh boy we gardeners are keen to go now, but take it easy, and do not overdo it. You will be enjoying snowdrops and aconites, as well as, possibly, early daffodils and crocus. If you have hellebores, they will provide great pleasure now too. Sweet scented Mahonia japonica, Hamamelis Hollis, and wintersweet perfume the flower garden. Plant lily bulbs and divide perennials. Complete the pruning of fruit trees, and spray with dormant oil, plant new bush and cane fruits and prune existing ones. You can sow parsley outside, and at the end of the month, broad beans, leeks, radishes and shallots. You can plant them about two weeks earlier if you have a cold frame. One of the best things you can do is join a garden club!!! You will find everyone there very friendly and helpful, and always willing to share their knowledge (and a few plants as well!) The Baynes Sound Garden Club meets at 7:00 p.m., the first Thursday of the month at the OAP Hall on Ships Point Road. You will be warmly welcomed.

FANNY BAY SALMONID ENHANCEMENT SOCIETY (FBSES)

“Hatchery in desperate need of water!” Who would have ever thought that in this temperate rainforest these words would be uttered. Lack of rain and snow has us very concerned about the future spring and summer conditions in all the creeks and rivers. A good snowpack can mean plenty of cool runoff for fish well into summer, no snowpack can mean streams potentially drying up earlier in the spring. This is bad for fish and more work for volunteers.

Incubating at the Rosewall hatchery over the winter we have close to 200,000 chum eggs and approximately 85,000 coho eggs. Our volunteers have put out a huge effort this year and adipose fin clipped all 63 000 coho fry. Fall of 2015 will be the telling tale when these fish return and we can see how ocean survival has been on this run of hatchery fish. Please note in May you will have the opportunity to release some of these clipped fry at the River Never Sleeps Festival.

Close to one million pink eggs are incubating at our Wilfred Hatchery site with a few volunteers taking daily walks up the trail to check on flows, any beaver activity and any problems that might arise.

Early January we had a crew who planted some trees at Relic, a side channel off Cook Creek. With this good habitat they should grow and give some shade to the side channel in a few decades!!

Seems like eons ago but we had our annual Christmas party at the Deep Bay Research Centre with a record number of volunteers bringing in all sorts of treats to nibble on. Santa of course made the trek which led to lots of fun and much laughter! The Research Centre is always a fantastic place to hold a meeting or fun event, beautiful spot!

If you would like to help and see what is happening at the hatchery, our hours of operation are Wednesdays and Saturdays 9 am to 12 pm, Rosewall Creek on Berray Road. We just tallied up the volunteer hours for 2013 and for the 4th consecutive year we had over 6,500 amazing volunteer hours. MANY, MANY THANKS! Check out our website www.fbSES.ca.

REIKI by Kathy Trew

Reiki is an energy-based, holistic healing approach introduced into Japan in the late 1800's. It uses light-touch hand placement(or none at all) on or above the bod. The Reiki practitioner acts as an energy conduit, or channel, who directs the flow of universal healing energy to influence not only the physical body, but also the emotional, mental and spiritual bodies as well. Cost of a Reiki Session and where do you get one?


