ANNY BAY, NATURALLY

I was invited to write a bird column for the "Flyer" but while I'm enraptured by birds, my love for nature includes all animals, and wild plants as well. I hope you enjoy "Fanny Bay, Naturally," which will feature both the fauna (feathered and otherwise) and flora of this lovely area we call home.

We'll start with a species that does not usually come to mind when we think about nature, yet there is an abundance of them in Fanny Bay and, in fact, they are rather famous oysters!

Most of the oysters on the shores of Fanny Bay are Pacific oysters, which are native to the Pacific coastline of Asia. They were introduced to North American shorelines in the 1920s, and in some areas of the world, are classed as an invasive species, often competing with native species. The Olympia oyster, which is BC's only native oyster, is a species of "Special Concern" in Canada. Environmental extremes, like last winter, and disease are thought to have played a part in the historic decline of the Olympia oyster, but over-fishing is the main factor. Other possible causes, such as pollution and alteration of habitat due to human activities, have not been studied in Canada.

Oysters start life when a female oyster discharges hundreds of thousands of eggs into the water, which develop into larvae within six hours. The larvae live suspended in the water for two to three weeks, then attach to a hard surface, at which time they are called "spat." The hard surface can be rock or marine debris or, most commonly, oyster shells! No matter where they settle, oysters orient themselves with the flat side of the shell down and the flared bigger half of the shell up. Oysters reach maturity within a year. Maximum life



span is thought to be about ten years.

A mature oyster is equipped with a small three-chambered heart, a pair of kidneys, and a nervous system, but doesn't have a central brain. Oysters 'breathe'

by exchanging oxygen and carbon dioxide with water filtered through their gills. Oysters also feed by drawing water over their gills. Suspended plankton and other particles become trapped in the mucus of the gills and are transported to the mouth for digestion.

Natural oyster reefs, composed of living and dead oyster shells, can get quite large, with thousands of oysters joined together. These reefs provide important nursery habitat for various species of fish and crabs. Small creatures, such as sea anemones, barnacles, and hooked mussels, also inhabit oyster reefs, where they are protected from predators. Oysters do their bit for the environment - a single mature oyster is capable of filtering up to 50 gallons of water a day during feeding and breathing, which can significantly improve water quality and clarity. Oyster reefs can also play a part in erosion control by buffering waves.

You might glean some gems of wisdom from this column, but don't expect to find any pearls in the oysters of Fanny Bay. Although any shellfish can grow a pearl, they are rare and usually not valuable. Most pearls of value are extracted from 'pearl oysters,' which are not true oysters at all!



- -no raked material, to avoid stones injuring the crew or damaging the machinery (raked material can be composted)
- -stack material parallel to the street, butt ends facing the same direction

FBSES REPORT

wishing for rain and here we are again hoping for some of the wet stuff, not just for the wildfires that have hit BC but also for the streams. Some creeks have dried up completely and others are extremely low. The water that is left in the creeks is at an elevated temperature and holds less oxygen, a situation that is very stressful for fish. As much as we enjoy the sun the sooner we get rain the happier the coho fry and cutthroat trout will be and the sooner the pink salmon will return, with chum and coho not far behind.

As mentioned in last month's report we utilized the new Coanda intake in July to increase river water flow into the hatchery which worked very well. However, as the creek level continued to drop, the decision was made to change over to well water (generously supplied by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans) thus allowing more water to continue flowing in creek — supplying



the wild fish with more water. We did salvage over 9000 coho fry from Rosewall Creek before it dried at the lower end and the Rosewall hatchery, or 'Club Rosewall' as we call it, has maximized the number of these 'salvaged' fish at just over 30,000. Supplied with cool water and several meals a day, these coho have it 'made in the shade'.

We will start clipping our brood coho fry in September, as well, September is time to prepare the hatchery for the return of the chum and coho in October and November. All of a sudden, it is upon us and we want to make sure everything is in order.

September is also our usual trek to Quinsam hatchery near Campbell River to help take the eggs from the returning pink salmon. In the late fall, we will receive about 1 million of these eggs to complete incubation at the Wilfred Hatchery.

Come and learn a new skill – 'fin clipping'. Or join in a pink salmon egg take.






