ARCEL TAX AND WATER TOLLS The 2018 annual parcel tax and water toll invoices are being mailed out at the end of January. Payment is due by Thursday, March 1, 2018. Payments received after March 1st, will incur a 10% late fee. Methods of payment include cheque, money order, e-transfer. The credit union system has SPID listed as a utility for online payments and the Union Bay Credit Union will take payment for a small fee. Please note your property address and roll number.

The SPVFA is collecting deposit-only cans and bottles to raise funds for fire protection training and equipment. Container donations can be made at the blue bins in front of the SPID office at 7729 Vivian Way. Any beverage container that required a deposit at time if purchase is welcome, though please no home-brew bottles, non-deposit tetra-pak containers or milk cartons. If in doubt, eligible containers will note "return for refund where applicable" and have a bar code.

## EAUFORT WATERSHED STEWARDS REPORT

Representatives from the BTW met with the administrators of the Regional District of Nanaimo's Watershed Protection Division last month to learn more about the watershed testing program used in the RDN. Our group is developing a watershed testing program, modelled on the RDN's program, to be used, initially, in the Fanny Bay Area. It will be limited to one or two streams to begin with. Once it is up and running we will submit a proposal to the Comox Valley Regional District to fund an expanded program. We believe that protecting our pristine drinking water now is far cheaper than remediation in the future. And protection begins with monitoring.

Also, BWS will be installing a well level monitoring system at the Fanny Bay Hall. It will be a test of a high-tech, low-cost solution. We will use it as a demonstration project to encourage and inspire you, the reader, to begin thinking more about tracking your well levels. As the climate continues to change, our aquifers may be affected. Without having good, solid baseline data it will be hard to spot trends. And in the hydrogeologic realm good data can take years to develop. So we need to start now!

Please contact us if you have historic well data. And contact us if you want help in setting up a monitoring program. Your questions always welcome.



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

Y THE TIME YOU READ THIS item in the Flyer thousands of new lives will have begun in the streams that

we live near, cross on the highways, or worry about when the rain doesn't stop and the water starts to rise. Those streams and the water they carry to Georgia Strait are the incubators that raise the wild salmon that are the symbol for all of us of nature's bounty and of her harshness; thousands will be born, dozens will survive to return to those streams and renew their lifecycle.

Incubation trays full of eggs

At the hatcheries your friends in the Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society operate on Berray Road, conveniently located next to Rosewall Creek, and on Wilfred Creek, those same lives start in stacks of plastic trays constantly flooded with creek water, and continue in large fibreglass tanks. Not quite as romantic as a wild stream but considerably more nurturing for the occupants.

The new year starts for salmon about the same time it does for us, and the drive to live that salmon possess is stronger than most resolutions. For the

salmon in the hatcheries, the chance of survival is greater. That survival happens under the care of volunteers who are now and everyday spending time and effort in feeding, cleaning, repairing, building and, always, watching over the salmon and their home on the creek.

Fanny Bay's volunteers will be raising about 50,000 salmon from the returning brood stock we harvested in 2017, and most of them will be released in the spring of 2019 as 'smolts', salmon averaging about 3 or 4 inches (75mm) in length and half an ounce in weight (15 grams). Between now and then, they will get a lot of kind attention from

> FBSES volunteers. After their release, the attention will no doubt continue, but it won't be kind.

> This spring, we'll be releasing about 70 thousand smolts from 2016's incubation before and they're gone, vou're welcome to come and see them Wednesday and Saturday mornings when we get together to work as a group, and of course you're also welcome to return and dis-



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### ANNY BAY NATURALLY

Most mornings throughout the year I walk my dogs along the trails in my neighborhood. Almost without fail,

when we pass by a particular tree, we are scolded mercilessly by a red squirrel. A verv bold little guy/ gal, he/she skips around the trunk and



leaps from branch to branch, chattering away until we have gone by. Then winter comes and he rarely makes an appearance. Does he hibernate?

The short answer is "no." Because of his high energy needs, this restless rodent is not capable of packing enough pounds onto his small frame to sustain himself through a long winter's nap. Red squirrels are active all year, however they will remain in dens during severe winter weather, sleeping, and leaving only once a day, usually in the afternoon, to retrieve food from their caches. This explains why we don't see "our" squirrel during morning walks at this time of year.

Overwintering dens are usually located in hollow trees, abandoned tree cavities, or under stumps, fallen logs, or rock piles. Sometimes a small supply of food is stored within the den so that the babies is another, but before weaning, squirrel does not have to leave the warm comfort of home for a day or two

> during a spell of particularly cold weather.

The diet of red squirrels consists primarily of the seeds, nuts, and cones of conifers. Have you ever been in the woods during a "rain" of cones? Once the seeds are mature, red squirrels will cut virtually all

the cones from their branches and let them fall to the ground. They gather the fallen cones into huge middens of up to three feet deep and several yards across. Underground or shady and humid sites are preferred for middens, to prevent the cones from drying out and dropping their seeds. These sites are often used year after year, with the nearby discard piles of emptied cones becoming quite conspicuous. Red squirrels also dine on other delicacies such as flowers, bark, and insects, but the seeds of conifer cones are definitely the mainstay of the red squirrel's diet.

Squirrels are extremely territorial, living as loners and defending their home plot against both their own and other squirrel species. Mating is one of the few occasions for social contact. The social interaction between mother and

the mother moves her young to a nest on the edge of her territory, excluding them from the rest of it, and then reclaiming her own "space" once she has sent them out in the world to fend for themselves.

There has been a lot of misinformation circulating about grey squirrels displacing native species (red squirrels and Douglas squirrels). Several studies done in BC show that grey squirrels, having different shelter and food preferences to native squirrels, are better adapted to urban areas. Native squirrels prefer forest habitat and move out when urban development moves in.



Meanwhile the grey squirrels remain, creating the misconception that the greys have chased the natives out, when really development and loss of coniferous forests are more likely responsible for native squirrel population declines.

### ELP STOP ILLEGAL DUMPING What is Illegal Dumping?

Illegal dumping is the improper disposal of waste in public or private areas,

such as parks, rural properties and logging roads. Illegal dumping impacts the environment and our communities and is a growing problem.

In 2017, the CSWM board approved a new public education strate-

gy and an illegal dumping Bylaw #470 -CSWM Illegal Dumping Regulations, to ensure consistency in wording, enforcement and fines across the region.

The most common items found at illegal dump sites are household garbage, construction materials, yard waste and appliance.

The easiest way to prevent illegal dumping is to ensure that your waste is disposed of properly. Fines for illegally dumped material apply to those who own the garbage, not just those who dump it.

Before allowing someone else to dispose of waste for you, make sure you know it is not being illegal dumped. Ask your contractor or junk removal

company for disposal slips with your invoice to ensure your waste materials are being properly disposed of. The new

Before considering dumping something illegally try using other free



disposal resources that won't pollute or harm the environment.

All solid waste originating within the boundaries of the Comox Valley and Strathcona Regional Districts will be Comox accepted at the ley and Campbell River waste management centres.

# HAT ARE THE CONSEQUENCES OF ILLEGAL DUMPING?

It is no longer uncommon to see or find huge piles of wastes, household items, construction waste or used products dumped by the road side, in the forests, or in non-designated dumping sites. This trend is on the rise and is increasingly becoming a problem because it hinders the objective of keeping the environment clean and can have serious impacts on wildlife and habitat not to mention tax dollars for clean-up.

Land, water and air pollution in the neighborhood are primarily caused by illegal dumping. The chemicals and non-biodegradable materials in the waste affect the physical environment and the waterways by contaminating groundwater and soil. The wastes can also spread weeds and pests therefore affecting agriculture and wildlife.

Biodiversity is important for maintaining balance of the ecosystem in the form of combating pollution, restoring nutrients, protecting water sources and stabilizing climate. Weeds from yards dumped in the brush can grow and overtake indigenous plants converting an area to a monoculture.

The illegal dumping of chemicals, tires and yard/green waste can augment the risk of wildfires. Unlike nature, humans dump large concentrated piles from pick-ups and trailers. As it dries that pile can become a problem by catching fire out where there is little supervision. Gaining access to a back woods area to fight the fire can take precious time. In our recent hot summers this could put homes in our community in jeopardy.


