SPID REPORT

ATER CONSERVATION Why conserve when we live in a rainforest? Although we average more than a meter of precipitation each year, most of this falls between October and March. Our aquifer is replenished by rain and snow melt, but during dry periods, there is little moisture available to recharge it. Environment temperatures during May-July. This may accelerate snow melt in the mountains now, so that there's less freshwater melt available to our aquifer later in the summer. Because of our location next to the sea, we are vulnerable to saltwater intrusion if our aguifer drops too low and cannot maintain pressure against sea water to keep it out. This is an issue that affects many coastal communities worldwide, and one we should do everything possible to prevent. Additionally, we all pay for the electricity used to pump water from our wells conservation keeps water tolls lower for everyone. Canada's seasonal forecast is calling for higher than normal the tap waiting for the water to cool. Let your grass go dormant for the summer - established lawns will green up when the rains return. Water between 5-9 am or 7-10 pm, and never sprinkle during hot or windy weather, as it will evaporate before it reaches the roots. Set a timer as a reminder to turn off your sprinkler. Raise your mower blades to 2" as longer grass shades the roots and reduces evaporation. Mulch to reduce evaporation and discourage water-hogging weeds. 

FBSES REPORT

OES IT SEEM LIKE IT JUST stopped raining? It didn't rain Sunday May 6th, and that's when 623 people came to the FBSES Berray Road hatchery site for our 12th Annual River Never Sleeps Festival. That 623 included 505 members of the public, which included lots of Fanny Bayites, 36 members of FBSES and 82 other volunteer types from all over the island. Fanny Bay's Volunteer fire fighters even came twice, once first thing Sunday morning to attend a power transformer fire on Berray Road, and then later to set up their own display. FBSES was happy to see them both times, but especially after they reopened Berray to all our River Never Sleeps traffic.

Other numbers are adding up this year: even though that rain just stopped and there's still snow on the hills, some creeks are dropping fast. Ron Mielke and Tom Hutton have started fish salvage McNaughton Creek, and our first salvage tank contains the 36 coho smolts and seven fry they found in a cut-off pool under the E&N trestle. Fry salvage as it's practised at FBSES is a major contributor to the health of all our streams and the survival of wild salmon.

Some relevant numbers from years past; in the years 1997 to 2014 FBSES volunteers salvaged, which is to say captured, contained, transported, (usually by buckets with air bubblers and by walking a lot of the way) counted into our holding tanks, fed and cared for, and then when the rains returned in November, returned said fish to their same stream homes. For a total of 412,649. Or an average of 22,925 a year although actual numbers- they are all counted, remember - varied from 8,305 in 1997 to 52,312 in 2001, to 9,860 in 2007, to 56,737 in 2014. One reason for the variations



is that every year is somewhat different weather wise, especially in the time the hot weather starts and the streams start to disappear into their gravel beds. The other is that salvage is labour intensive, and needs time and people. Since fry salvage in our creeks is one of those things that belongs in the list of most fun you can have with your clothes on, we really wonder why more people don't want to help. If you'd like to stay dressed and have fun, we have a bucket for you.

More with the numbers: since 2008, Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society volunteers logged 80,200 hours of time on the job. And a lot of time is worked and not logged, especially by our executive members.

And we can't talk about numbers around FBSES without a mention of our favourite numbers person, Brenda Fisher, who was our outstanding treasurer, money person and go-to for everything financial around the hatchery. Our loss is minor compared to that of her family and husband Bryan, and many Fanny Bay residents will remember her from the Union Bay Credit Union, but we will all miss our compatriot and coworker, and friend. Celebration of Life for Brenda Fisher will be held at Dove Creek Hall, 3400 Burns Rd. Courtenay, June 2 from 12:30 to 3:30.



Now we call them hummingbirds, named for the buzz or hum of their wings. Two species inhabit our area: Rufous, here from spring to autumn, and Anna's, often a year-round resident. Originally Anna's hummingbirds bred only in southern California and the Baja Peninsula, but the introduction of exotic ornamental plants in the Pacific Northwest has allowed the species to expand its range.

exceeds an amazing 54 km/h and they can fly as far as 3200 km during migration. The tiny hummingbird's heart rate can reach 1,260 beats per minute, with a breathing rate of up to 250 breaths per minute!

Hummingbirds begin nesting as early as mid-December and as late as June. The female builds a small round nest,

Please look carefully for them before pruning!

> Small insects are an important protein source for hummingbirds, but they also feed on nectar from flowers. To create a long-season hummingbird garden, use a variety of plants with staggered bloom times and keep in mind that hummingbirds are most attracted to colourful flowers with tubular blossoms.

> Although natural nectar sources are preferable, sugar-water from feeders can provide a reliable source of energy when flowers are less abundant. Select a feeder that has some red components, with several "ports." Since the feeder must be cleaned regularly (at least every week, more often if temperatures are high or if it's in the sun) with a bottle brush and hot water with a little vinegar to prevent mold and bacteria, your first choice should be a feeder with a wide opening, preferably glass for the "jar" part (easier to keep clean than plastic). A ratio of one part white granulated sugar to four parts water is the recommended recipe (a heavier sugar solution can cause fatal hardening of the liver). Boil the water for one minute and stir in the sugar until dissolved, then remove

from heat and let cool before filling the feeder. Extra solution can be refrigerated in a glass jar with lid for three or four weeks. Organic and raw sugar, brown sugar, agave syrup, molasses, artificial sweeteners, and honey should NOT be used for various health related reasons. Red food colouring, once thought to be required, is now considered unnecessary.

In addition to food sources, providing trees and shrubbery for shelter and nesting, and plants with large leaves that collect water after a rain or heavy dew will help attract these fascinating little birds to your yard. With



some knowledge and a little effort, you can easily provide

BEAUFORT WATERSHED STEWARDS is preparing for our first season of stream monitoring. Thanks to several generous donations we have the money to purchase the required equipment. In early July two BWS members will attend training sessions, sponsored by the Regional District of Nanaimo, to learn how to use the equipment.

In July and August, during the low flow periods, and then again in the fall when the heavy rains arrive, we will take samples from Wilfred Creek, Cougar-Cowie Creek and Mud Bay Creek. We will measure turbidity, dissolved oxygen, temperature and specific conductivity. The data we gather will help us to understand how these important watersheds respond to varying climate conditions and to get a sense of their overall health. Our goal over the next several years is to create baseline data which will allow us to track trends and respond to problems as needed in the future.
