Fanny Bay had big party

Chairman Les Aviss opened the festivities with greetings to all present, then turned the mike over to Anne Chligfour, a popular member of the community for the past 30 years. She introduced the head table guests then gave a short resume of the history of the hall.

In 1930 local residents formed a committee to consider building a community hall. Abe McLaughlin, a pioneer settler of Fanny Bay, donated a 3-acre plot of his land, and after negotiating a small loan the committee began building on the land beside what is now Highway 19, just north of Wilfert (Coal) Creek. In September, 1931, the hall was officially opened.

Nineteen names are listed as the builders, and two men were present on Oct. 24 to receive the applause of the gathering. These were Jack Willis and Norey Hasings. Fred Larsen, Leo Rogers and Henry Carney were unable to attend. Deceased, but represented by family members who were duly acknowledge, were Herb and

Lou Larsen, Ted Robertson, Fred O'Neill, James Sturgeon, Joe Hastings, Don and Wade McLaughlin, Pete Robertson Sr., Fred Lund Sr., Jack Adams, Howard Kelsey, Harold Rogers and Art Pratt Sr. The local shingle mill, owned and operated by Rayoneir, Ltd., was the main industry in Fanny Bay at that time, and in the following 30 years, with Bill Fulton as resident-manager, gave much assistance in the building materials part of the construction.

The Fanny Bay Athletic and Social Society was formed and duly registered under the Provincial Societies Act, some 45 years ago, and 12 Directors are elected in annual membership meeting, and this Directorate run the business of the hall and adjacent playground. The hall today is a far cry from the 'pre-Hydro' years, and now have modern facilities, a good oil furnace, a stage addition was build on some years ago, and a good kitchen equipped to cater to hundreds of patrons. All these things attest to the over-all co-

operation of volunteer labor through the past half-century.

The Christmas Party for local children has been a continuous event for over 40 years, and only recently the free gift for all young children had to be discontinued because of the cost factor. The Halloween Party is also a yearly event to keep "small fry" off the Highway.

The 'Fishermen's Farewell' spring banquet and dance and the 'Welcome Home, Fishermen' fall banquet and dance, spear-headed by Konrad and Helen Pettersen, Bill and Barbara Wallace, Jack and Vilma Pridge and Nat and Irene Ross, became a very well-known twice-yearly social party and continued so for 15 years.

In 1972 a Summer Barbecue, an original idea put forward by Malcom Pearce, featuring salmon and beef, and held a Sunday in mid-July, is always well attended, and now has become an annual event.

Then there are the innumerable young brides-to-

be, who grew up in the community, have sat through their wedding 'showers', later danced at their wedding receptions, in the Fanny Bay hall. One signal occasion in 1978 was the bridal showers, then the wedding reception for two young couples, when the twin daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pridge, Marlene and Darlene, chose the same wedding day, and over 300 people jammed the hall and grounds for the happy occasion.

These are only major events for the community hall, there are many other activities throughout the year. The Directorate must show that the hall is being used by community residents, to receive the Provincial Government grants.

For the gala 50th anniversary party, the hall was appropriately decorated in gold color anniversary theme, and the large gold and white iced cake, made and decorated by Penny Macey of Fanny Bay, drew the admiration of all present. It tasted good, too.

WATER CONSERVATION STAGE 2 GUIDELINES NOW IN EFFECT

Temperatures soared in July and August, and the last several months have seen scant rainfall. SPID trustees and

water operators have been monitoring our water system, as well as provincial drought and wildfire conditions. The province has classified East Vancouver Island at drought level 4, or Extremely Dry. Other Island water districts have recently raised their conservation levels. Under extended hot, dry conditions, it is important that we preserve aquifer levels in case of fire here on the Point or in neighbouring communities with whom we have mutual aid fire agreements.

As a result, SPID has implemented Stage 2 water conservation guidelines as of August 17.

Outdoor watering is now restricted to a **maximum of 3** hours per day between the hours of 7:00 pm and 10:00 am. Hand watering should be done using a hand-held container or a hose equipped with a shutoff device. Vegetable gardens, fruit trees and newly planted lawns are exempt from all restrictions. FANNY BAY NATURALLY

It has been, and continues to be, an extremely dry summer, which is not only hard on forests, people, and gardens, but is also a challenge to wildlife. Birdbaths, ponds, and pans of water are much appreciated by birds, insects, squirrels, frogs, and many other animals. My sister, who lives near Spider Lake, put a pan of water outside her living room window, and was she ever surprised to see a sleek black bear come by for a drink!

My birdbath visitors are not nearly as thrilling but I was delighted to see a trio of chickadees having a sip at my birdbath recently. To me, chickadees are a harbinger of autumn (and hopefully the end of the long hot summer!). Though year-round residents, they seem to do a disappearing act in early summer and reappear just before autumn. There are several reasons - once the trees have leafed out in the spring, chickadees are harder to spot, and they become more secretive during the breeding season. Some even move to higher elevations for the summer but the main reason we see less of chickadees in summertime is due to a change of diet.

In winter, chickadees depend mainly on seed for food and so we frequently see them at our back yard feeders. However the chickadee's digestive system changes from season to season. Like all birds, chickadees have a two-chambered stomach, with the gizzard being the muscular portion that grinds seeds. The front portion, the

proventriculus, secretes enzymes and acids that digest animal matter such as insects. In winter-time, the gizzard is larger and the proventriculus small. As spring approaches, the gizzard decreases in size and the proventriculus enlarges, making insects more easy to digest. Rather than coming to feeders in summer, chickadees spend



most of their foraging time in trees and shrubs where the insects are. That said, don't be surprised to see a chickadee eating seed in the summer on occasion - there may be a

large brood to feed and not enough insects! There are several species of chickadee in North America - the one we see here is the chesnut-backed chickadee. This small bird, about five inches from bill to tail tip, has a dark crown and white stripes on its head and is easily distinguished from other chickadees by its bright chestnut back and flanks. The 'chick-a-dee-dee-dee' call of the chesnut-backed is higher and thinner than other chickadees, almost squeaky, and with fewer 'dees.' Chickadees are usually seen in small flocks of up to 14 birds. During the non-breeding season, other birds such as nut-hatches often join chickadee flocks love to splash around!

Raising up to three broods annually, chesnut-backed chickadees make nests in holes, usually in dead or decaying trees. Almost half the nesting material is fur - rabbit and deer hair are most common. A layer of fur about a half-inch thick is used to cover the five to ten spotted eggs when the adults leave the nest to forage.

Nests are vulnerable to predators such as mice, squirrels, weasels, snakes, and black bears.

It is easy to attract chickadees to your back yard feeders with black-oil sunflower seeds. They also enjoy suet and peanuts. They can become quite tame once accustomed to a feeder; they will often come within a few feet of you if you stand quietly nearby. Nest boxes also attract these charming little birds to your yard - there are free plans on the internet at www.ealt.ca/kids/build-a-chickadee-nest-box. And don't forget the birdbath - chickadees love to splash around!

YOU MAY HAVE SEEN

some Fanny Bay volunteers doing strange things to some pretty flowers in Steele and Ackinclose and Deep Bay Creek. They were tearing out yellow flag-iris, *Iris pseudacorus* an invasive plant that is bad for streams it infests. It outcompetes cattails, sedges and rushes with its thickets of tall, strong plants with sword like leaves and those showy flowers on top of heavy matted roots that can block small streams like ours and make things difficult for salmon fry. Too much wood debris isn't good either, especially in culverts and little Apple-Cherry creek, near the firehall, got some TLC from the MOT and FBSES, and



PDQ, too. While your neighborhood salmonid enhancement volunteer is a fine fellow or girl, leaping tall buildings at a single bound, etc., they can't do everything. We get help from some equally committed folks at Project Watershed. Dan Bowen and Jennifer Sutherst of the group told us at



a recent talk why they're important to us; they plant the good stuff in the estuaries and shorelines that our fry need to hide in and feed around. Bowen said they are planting and restoring the eelgrass, salt-marshes and kelp beds from Oyster River to Annie Creek. Part of the reason for the talk was to learn from us and get our co-operation and they have that.

When a fry or smolt heads out into the estuary he's looking for that eelgrass and kelp and he needs to find it before something finds him. Their website is

Benthic macroinvertebrates are what we all call bugs for short, but in the streams, fry and smolts call them break-



fast, lunch and dinner. FBSES volunteers are always willing to learn some new tricks, and we picked up some with Registered Professional Biologist Dave Clough. After a slide show of stoneflies, caddisflies, riffle beetles and mayflies, and more, with their legs, (many), antennae,

tails, gills, and feelers it was time to go out into Rosewall Creek and find all of the above. You do this by walking up a stream with a very fine small net and turning over rocks underwater—this is best done in pairs—and then examining what you catch with a strong magnifier. And there they are, gourmet bugs for salmon.

Finally, one big fall event, the Pacific Salmon Foundation dinner in Courtenay on **September 29th is sold out**. The dinner will be the 14th annual, and the tickets, auctions and raffles generated \$41,000 in 2017 for Comox Valley salmonid enhancement groups.

FBSES president Judy Ackinclose has been involved in all of them, the last eight as chairperson.



ARE YOU CONCERNED ABOUT

It's been just over a year since the Beaufort Watershed Stewards (BWS) came into being. Our members have accomplished a great deal in one year. We have elected a Board of Directors and developed a mission statement: *to promote through stewardship, a healthy watershed that sustains the quality and quantity of water for future generations.*

We also established an action plan and began making contacts with other organizations. We have had display tables at the last two River Never Sleeps Festivals and at last year's Fanny Bay Meet Your Neighbour Day. We have joined the Comox Valley Conservation Partnership. We are also developing a well monitoring program to track local well levels. This will allow us to begin to understand our water sources and the potential connections between aquifers, as well as the various watersheds. If you are interested in being part of this program please let us know.

YOUR WATERSHED ?

This July we purchased two sophisticated, and expensive, water testing instruments. A grant from the Comox Valley Regional District (CVRD) and a donation from the Ships Point Improvement District (SPID) helped make that possible. But we are still short of the total amount required. More on that later. We felt that we couldn't afford to wait a year to begin the sampling program, so one of our members agreed to carry the cost temporarily. It takes at least three, but ideally five, years of data collection before any meaningful trends can be identified. We need to know what our water supply – watershed is doing as the climate continues to change. We feel there is an urgency to start monitoring our watershed now. At present, there is no one monitoring streams or wells in our area.

Two members of our group received instrument training from the Regional District of Nanaimo's Community Watershed Monitoring Program. We are

most appreciative for having been provided the training. As of August 7th, we started taking official measurements which will continue for a total of five weeks. And then again in October we will take measurements for another five consecutive weeks. This is in line with the Provincial protocol. Our data will be added to the Province's database and will help policy makers make decisions about water in our area. Additionally we are taking readings at the SPID wells which provides data that is useful to has and to SPID. But again, this requires human and financial resources. If you have expertise and some free time please give us a call.
