Fanny Bay had big party

Chairman Les Aviss opened the festivities with greetings to all present, then turned the mike over to Anne Chligfour, a popular member of the community for the past 30 years. She introduced the head table guests then gave a short resume of the history of the hall.

In 1930 local residents formed a committee to consider building a community hall. Abe McLaughlin, a pioneer settler of Fanny Bay, donated a 3-acre plot of his land, and after negotiating a small loan the committee began building on the land beside what is now Highway 19, just north of Wilfert (Coal) Creek. In September, 1931, the hall was officially opened.

Nineteen names are listed as the builders, and two men were present on Oct. 24 to receive the applause of the gathering. These were Jack Willis and Norey Hasings. Fred Larsen, Leo Rogers and Henry Carney were unable to Deceased, attend. represented by family members who were duly acknowledge, were Herb and

Lou Larsen, Ted Robertson, Fred O'Neill. **James** Sturgeon, Joe Hastings, Don and Wade McLaughlin, Pete Robertson Sr., Fred Lund Sr., Jack Adams, Howard Kelsey, Harold Rogers and Art Pratt Sr. The local shingle mill, owned and operated by Rayoneir, Ltd., was the main industry in Fanny Bay at that time, and in the following 30 years, with Bill Fulton as resident-manager, gave much assistance in the building materials part of the construction.

The Fanny Bay Athletic and Social Society was formed and duly registered under the Provincial Societies Act, some 45 years ago, and 12 Directors are elected in annual membership meeting. and this Directorate run the business of the hall and adjacent playground. The hall today is a far cry from the 'pre-Hydro' years, and now have modern facilities, a good oil furnace, a stage addition was build on some years ago, and a good kitchen equipped to cater to hundreds of patrons. All these things attest to the over-all cooperation of volunteer labor through the past half-century.

The Christmas Party for local children has been a continuous event for over 40 years, and only recently the free gift for all young children had to be discontinued because of the cost factor. The Halloween Party is also a yearly event to keep "small fry" off the Highway.

The 'Fishermen's Farewell' spring banquet and dance and 'Welcome Home. the Fishermen' fall banquet and dance, spear-headed by Konrad and Helen Pettersen. Bill and Barbara Wallace, Jack and Vilma Pridge and Nat and Irene Ross, became a very well-known twice-yearly social party and continued so for 15 years.

In 1972 a Summer Barbecue, an original idea put forward by Malcom Pearce, featuring salmon and beef, and held a Sunday in mid-July, is always well attended, and now has become an annual event.

Then there are the innumerable young brides-tobe, who grew up in the community, have sat through their wedding 'showers', later danced at their wedding receptions, in the Fanny Bay hall. One signal occasion in 1978 was the bridal showers. then the wedding reception for two young couples, when the twin daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pridge, Marlene and Darlene, chose the same wedding day, and over 300 people jammed the hall and grounds for the happy occasion.

These are only major events for the community hall, there are many other activities throughout the year. The Directorate must show that the hall is being used by community residents, to receive the Provincial Government grants.

For the gala 50th anniversary party, the hall was appropriately decorated in gold color anniversary them, and the large gold and white cake. made decorated by Penny Macey of Fanny Bay, drew the admiration of all present. It tasted good, too.

ATER CONSERVATION STAGE 2 GUIDELINES **NOW IN EFFECT**

Temperatures soared in July and August, and the last several months have seen scant rainfall. SPID trustees and

water operators have been monitoring our water system, as well as provincial drought and wildfire conditions. The province has classified East Vancouver Island at drought level 4, or Extremely Dry. Other Island water districts have recently raised their conservation levels. Under extended hot, dry conditions, it is important that we preserve aguifer levels in case of fire here on the Point or in neighbouring communities with whom we have mutual aid fire agreements.

As a result, SPID has implemented Stage 2 water conservation guidelines as of August 17.

Outdoor watering is now restricted to a maximum of 3 hours per day between the hours of 7:00 pm and 10:00 am. Hand watering should be done using a hand-held container or a hose equipped with a shutoff device. Vegetable gardens, fruit trees and newly planted lawns are exempt from all restrictions. Ships Point Volunteer Fire Fighters Association will hold a Chipping Day for Ships Point residents on Saturday, Sept **29th** Yard waste will be chipped at the roadside if it fits the following criteria:

-clean brush only, branches 1/2" to 4" in diameter, no smaller or larger, foliage does not need to be removed -no raked material, to avoid stones

injuring the crew or damaging the machinery (raked material can be composted) -no blackberry stalks -stack material parallel to the street, butt ends facing the same direction. Chips can be kept by the resident or will be hauled away.


