

Union Bay CREDIT UNION LIVE AT FANNY BAY HALL presents a return visit of Bentall, Taylor, Ulrich (aka BTU), following their sold out performance here two years ago. Legendary Canadian singer-songwriters Barney Bentall, Tom Taylor, and Shari Ulrich appear in concert at the Fanny Bay Community Hall on Sunday, February 3rd for a special afternoon concert at 2:30 pm (doors open at 2 pm).

The trio first played together in 2007 at a Bluebird North songwriters' concert on their home island - Bowen Island. They subsequently recorded two albums together and have continued to enjoy touring together whenever their schedules permit.

Barney Bentall travelled extensively in the late '80s and '90s before trading rock-and-roll for the life of a cattle rancher in the Cariboo in 2000. Bentall still owns the ranch, but eventually couldn't resist the music. In 2006, he resumed recording and touring, releasing three solo albums. His popular annual Cariboo Express tour just celebrated it's 13th year raising critical funds for food banks and charities across Western Canada.

Shari Ulrich's finesse fiddle and mandolin and work with Pied Pumkin and the Hometown Band, paved the way for her solo career as a touring songwriter. 2014 her 8th solo album earned her "Songwriter of the Year" at the Canadian Folk Music Awards. It is her 24th release, including her work with the Pumkin, UHF, BTU, and CFMA winner The High Bar Gang (a 7 piece bluegrass band with Barney) She is releasing her new album in 2019.

Tom Taylor has spent most of his musical career playing in the Vancouver cult band "She Stole My Beer". He has released 3 solo albums and carries on the classic tradition of the singer/songwriter - a troubadour who can effortlessly draw listeners into his world. Tom's work was in part the catalyst for Barney and Shari wanting to form the trio.





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

Are you Fire Smart?

While it may seem that the summer wildfire season is far away, it's never too soon to start thinking about and planning for safety. We live in a wildfire interface area, and we're all responsible for helping to reduce the risk of fire spreading in our community. But how can we do that?

The BC Wildfire Service suggests focusing on three priority zones around your home.

Priority Zone 1, within the first 10 meters around your home

This should be a fire-resistant zone, free of all materials that could easily ignite from a fire. Regularly clear your roof and gutters of debris. Keep woodpiles, propane tanks and other combustibles 10 meters away from your house. Regularly mow your lawn, and rake up tree needles, leaves and other debris. Don't forget to check for debris or vegetation under the deck or stairs; flying embers can spark a fire under there. Remove fallen limbs and other flammable vegetation (the SPVFA chipping program can help you safely remove woody debris from your yard - stay tuned for the date of the spring chipping event). Install a chimney spark arrestor and fire resistant mesh screens on your eaves and vents to prevent embers from entering.

Priority Zone 2, 10-30 meters

Reduce fuels that will increase a fire's spread. Regularly clear fallen branches, dry grass, needles and other flammable debris. from the ground. Prune the lower branches of trees within 2 meters of the ground. If you're planting new trees, choose deciduous varieties that are naturally fire resistant, rather than conifers.

Priority Zone 3, 30-100 meters

Thin out trees and other vegetation to slow a fire and reduce its intensity. Retain deciduous trees which are resistant to wildfire. Space coniferous trees at least 3 meters apart and remove any understory growth that could act as a ladder to move fire into the tree tops and spread. Clear debris from the ground.

A little prevention will go a long way to keep our community safe.





to hear it, does it make a sound?"

This is a long standing philosophical question, and during January's wind, rain, and snow storms, I cannot say I heard as long to decay as it took to grow before it fell, i.e. trees that

trees falling (from the safety of my house), but I did hear some loud cracks as branches snapped. None-the-less, many trees did fall in the nearby forest, and if my hearing was more acute, I might have heard the sounds of nature rejoicing at the prospect of nourishment for many years to come.

Most trees in the forest do not immediately die and fall as a direct result of a storm. More often than not, a tree dies from a number of factors weakening it over many years - fire, drought, dis-

ease, fungus, and insects, to name a few. During this time, the Sunshine Coast, at the ripe old age of 1,835 years. dying tree provides shelter and/or food to many small mampoint of decay where they can no longer anchor the tree, and that is when a storm can cause the tree to crash to the ground.

When a tree falls, it opens up an area of sunlight in the forest. The tree itself no longer blocks sunlight, and other trees, branches, and bushes may be smashed when the tree falls, allowing even more sunlight in. As it lays on the forest floor, the fallen tree will be further decayed by fungus, microbes, and insects. Its surface will eventually become

crumbly and soil-like, at which time wayward seeds that drift onto the log will have a perfect place to grow rich organic soil, sunlight, and a platform to raise seedlings above the undergrowth - all resources essential for life that are in short supply in the competitive system of the forest. These logs are called "nurse logs." Large stumps serve the same purpose but do



not create as many parking spots for seeds as logs do!

In the forest, we sometimes see a colonnade of trees that appear to be growing on stilts - they likely started life in a fairly straight line on a nurse log, their roots growing through and around the log into the soil below. Once the log had com


"If a tree falls in the forest and no one is around pletely decayed, the new trees' roots remain, in bizarre twisted shapes with open areas where the log once was.

The commonly accepted rule of thumb is that a tree takes

are hundreds of years old will take hundreds of years to decay. This means that nurse logs formed by very old trees will remain available as a substrate for growth for hundreds of years, and the new generation of trees will already be old before their nurse logs disintegrate completely. The coastal rainforest of western North America is noted for the enormous size and great age of its trees. Some of the oldest trees in these forests were "nursing" at the same time Christopher Columbus was nursing, as a baby! A database of living ancient trees from around the world cites a couple of very old trees on Vancouver Island: a cedar dated at 1,636 years old and a Douglas fir at 1,350 years old. The longest lived tree on record in Canada was felled in 1980 during a clear-cut logging operation on the

The next time you walk in the forest, look for nurse logs in mals, birds, and insects. Eventually the roots will reach the various stages of decay and marvel at the role they play in the regeneration and evolution of the forest over years, decades, centuries, and even millennia.

ISH ARE NOT GENERALLY KNOWN FOR THEIR personality, but at the Fanny Bay Salmonid

Enhancement Society we do get attached to all the little creatures we raise. That means some tough love when a chronic, transferrable and pernicious disease, that hides in growing salmon until they're

about six months old, shows up in our brood stock. Bacterial fied himself that service is available, and got a deal for us Kidney Disease is sneaky, underhanded and clever. One of its from Island Tractor in Courtenay. cleverness's is being hard to diagnose and requiring a disease culture that takes about six weeks. Every year since 2014, FBSES has sent tissue samples of each of its brood fish to the Fish Health Veterinarian at the Pacific Biological Station in Naniamo and hoped for the best. 2015 was our worst year, but 2018 has come second. It means of the 39 females and 86 males we harvested, only the eggs of 12 females, fertilized by 25 males, were low risk for infection. BKD is so common on the West Coast that only two of our brood stock were considered negative for the bacterium. It means a lot of work has to

go to the compost pit but part of enhancement is reducing threats to salmon in our streams and it has to be done.

We now have a new tool to work with at the hatchery. It's a Kubota BX23S that will be known as "Brenda" because it was the strong wish of our treasurer Brenda late Fisher that we lighten the workload on some of the mature, okay, old, frames that do so much here.



"Brenda" is FBSES' new tractor,in its carport with (LtoR) Ross Radford, Randy Lousier and Frank Lines.

A lovely orange, with a three blade mower, a front loader that can lift 192 kilos 1.8 meters (423 lbs/71 inches), and a backhoe for trenching or whatever, its purchase was made possible by Brenda's skilled management of our finances over



the years. While machines can make work easier, it takes people to make things hap pen. One of those people is director Keith Thibault, who did the shopping. found the machine to fit our needs, satis-






