

-stack material parallel to the street, butt ends facing the same direction.



The guest speaker is Janet Thony of the Farmers' Institute, who will be speaking about sustainable food production.



ANNY BAY NATURALLY

With all the snow we had in February, many of us are desperately casting about for signs of spring. An old wives' tale declares the robin as the first sign of spring, but in truth, our American robins are adaptable birds, and while many of them make their winter home as far south as Baja California (as some of us, in retrospect, wish we had done), there are many hardy souls, robins and humans alike, who remain here

year round. But where are these hardy robins? Well, just like us, they are hunkered down, waiting for milder weather to return, but instead of sitting by a cozy fireplace, the robins are roosting in the trees.

The name 'robin' is derived from the Latin word *ruber*, meaning red. In the fifteenth century, when human names were often given to familiar species, this bird came to be known as robin redbreast,



which was eventually shortened to just 'robin.'

Robins are so well known that a description is hardly necessary. A member of the thrush family, an American robin measures from nine to eleven inches long, and is greyish-brown in colour, darkening to black on the head and tail. The throat is streaked in black and white, and the breast, as we all know, is orange-red. Males and females are similarly coloured, with the female being somewhat duller overall.

The robin's song is a welcome herald of spring to the winter-weary. The melody of short rising and falling phrases is most often sung in the early morning and late evening. Coming upon the discarded half-shells of those lovely bluegreen robin eggs as the season advances, confirms that spring has indeed arrived. A robin lays four or five eggs in a nest of twigs, grasses, and mud, built in the crotch of a tree or other

suitable location. Incubation lasts 17 days and, after hatching, the young birds grow rapidly. Although two or three broods may be raised each season under favourable conditions, only 40 percent of nests are successful on average, and only a quarter of those fledglings survive through autumn. A robin can live for many years, with the oldest recorded American robin living to one month shy of its 14th birthday but, in nature, only about half of the robins alive in any given year will live to see the next.

'The early bird catches the worm' is a proverb that the rob-

in takes to heart. Robins eat a wide variety of fruit and insects depending on the time of day, but earthworms are the breakfast favourite. Because of this, it is wise to keep the 'breakfast table' - lawns and gardens - free of chemical pesticides and fertilizers. Not only are chemicals harmful and even lethal to robins, they also kill the worms and other insects that make up part of the robin's diet. Later in the day, robins prefer fruit, and berries are a favourite. My mountain ash tree was so heavily laden with berries last autumn that I feared the branches would break. A small flock of robins came to the rescue, making short work of the berries in just one afternoon! Robins can be enticed to a platform style feeder if it is stocked with fruit such as halved oranges, chopped apples, and berries. Although they don't care for birdseed, they might be tempted by hulled sunflower seeds or shelled peanuts, and they also enjoy suet and mealworms.

I saw a few robins in my garden in January but I haven't seen any since the snow descended upon us. Hopefully, when I next see those red, red robins bob, bob, bobbin' along in my yard, the snowstorms of 2019 will be well behind us!
