OUR FRIENDLY NEIGHBOURHOOD

Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society volunteer spends a lot of time at the hatchery, but sometimes duty and devotion to salmon calls him away. To places like Campbell River or the wild and rugged West Coast of Vancouver Island.

The Nitinat River Hatchery is way out there, a long drive from Fanny Bay via Port Alberni and the Carmanah

Main, and is a Department of Fisheries and Oceans operation that has a target this year of 35,000,000 chum eggs to raise to fry and release. That number is going to take a lot of work and five FBSES volunteers have spent four days there being part of it.

And another seven will have put in days at Quinsam River Hatchery in Campbell River. Both of these operations are super size, as opposed to us, who are more slider sized or maybe mini-donut size, but they're happy to have the help, and FBSES gets rewarded with Pink salmon eggs from Quinsam, which we raise to fry and release to populate Wilfred Creek.

At Nitinat, volunteers get put up in a bunkhouse—important advice from one of last years' trippers: "bring ear plugs" -- it could be that some of your fellow workers snore—but there is a real chef for the cookhouse meals and lots of local colour. Quinsam is a day trip and bring your own lunch, but at both, the work is real and intense at times.

Also in conjunction with Fire Prevention Week, Ships Point volunteer firefighters will be out knocking on doors for their annual community walkabout October 1-11, to discuss fire safety and answer questions. Open Burning

While many Ships Point residents are taking advantage of the twiceyearly chipping events offered by the Ships Point Volunteer Firefighters Association to deal with yard waste, SPID Bylaw 83 allows for open backyard burning without a permit October 15-April 15. For those who choose to burn yard waste, there are local and provincial regulations which must be followed.

One of the most critical factors for protecting air quality during yard waste burning is the province's Venting Index. The Venting Index forecasts local weather patterns that indicate whether airborne pollutants, such as smoke, will disperse or remain trapped at ground level.

BC restricts outdoor burning when the index is POOR (0-33) or FAIR (34-54), and burning at that time may risk a fine from the BC Conservation Officer Service. Please check the Venting Index and burn yard waste only when the forecast is GOOD (55-100).

The Venting Index is updated daily at spid.ca and is also available tollfree at 1-888-281-2992.

The following restrictions must be adhered to during open burning:

- -Fires must be attended by an adult at all times until extinguished.
- -Keep a shovel and a charged hose ready for immediate use if required.
- -Never burn in windy conditions.
- -Maximum size of a fire is not to exceed 1.5m by 1.5m by 1m (4.5 ft by 4.5 ft by 3 ft).
- -Do not burn within 5m (16 ft) of dry grass, brush, trees, wooden buildings or other flammable material.

-Never use an accelerant like gasoline or lighter fluid as that can pollute groundwater which we all drink.

- -Never burn garbage, pet waste or driftwood from the beach, which releases toxic smoke.
- -Beach fires are PROHIBITED at all times.

Please note: permits for open backyard burning will not be issued prior to October 15. The fire danger level is currently low, so Ships Point residents are allowed to have camp fires (maximum size 18") in non-commercial/non approved backyard burning appliances, and the use of burn barrels, tiki torches and tiger torches is now permitted. S LEADING SHORELINE RESTORATION efforts in our region. This work helps to mitigate some of the coastal erosion in the area, due to climate change, and helps build coastal resilience. It also creates nearshore

habitat for fish and wildlife. In January 2019, we finalized a conceptual shoreline restoration plan for salt marsh, eelgrass, and kelp beds extending from Oyster River in the north to Qualicum Bay in the south, in order to guide restoration efforts in the coming years. Of the 70 potential projects, a subset were identified as higher priority, including areas in Fanny Bay/Ships Point. Based on our plan, we have identified a proposed salt marsh restoration location near properties located on Stern Road. We would like to provide you with more information on the potential design and schedule for this work.

The criteria we set for our restoration planning were:

The location must be an area where salt marsh vegetation and substrate are eroding or have been lost, but where a stable salt marsh can be established and be self-sustaining;

The location must have good access for heavy machinery; and, Beach access for residents must be maintained.

In addition, Project Watershed is interested in protecting shoreline properties with natural techniques, and we see this as a very important secondary benefit to some of our projects. Salt marsh restoration, a type of green shores restoration, can be a very effective way to protect property without the need for expensive and potentially harmful interventions such as concrete walls or rip rap.

As we gain experience, we are refining the techniques used for our past successful projects. For this project, our engineering consultant has developed two conceptual design options.

One option is the creation of "headlands," which mimic natural rock formations. Headlands create reduced currents that allow sediment to settle, building up the elevation of the area between the headland and the shore. This technique is somewhat different from the saltmarsh berm (platform) design we used in two former projects in the K'ómoks Estuary, which created armoured platforms. While the two techniques are similar and have the same intended outcome, the headlands approach will protect a larger area of beach and allow for passive buildup of the saltmarsh sediments and natural recruitment of saltmarsh plants over time. Plus it gives Project Watershed a chance to explore a method of green shores work which, although it has been used successfully in other areas, is not a methodology that we have previously utilized.

The saltmarsh platform approach is one that we have undertaken before, will protect a smaller section of beach, will cost less to build and potentially blend in better with the existing shoreline. Hence there are some pros and cons to both approaches.

We are waiting for some material volumes to determine final cost estimates for both approaches. It also would be helpful to have input from local residents on these two design approaches to further assist us in developing our final restoration method for the site.

To meet our funding requirements, we must construct the salt marsh during 2019. Construction is tide dependent. The last window of time with appropriate tide levels is from October 8 – 11, 2019. Thus, we will be finalizing the design within the next few weeks.
