Ships Point is blessed to have so many volunteers who willingly give their time and energy to the benefit of their neighbours. The Ships Point Volunteer Firefighters Association, the Volunteer Firefighters, and many others gave up their weekend September 29 and 30 to run the semi-annual wood chipping day to reduce the amount of yard waste burned. An estimated 45 truckloads of brush were chipped. We can all enjoy clean air and reduce our carbon footprint thanks to their efforts.

Running a chipper all day is not an easy job. It is noisy, dirty, strenuous and dangerous work requiring ear protection, the safe operation of the Beelzebub A5000 (the chipper), chain-saws, traffic control, and a steady supply of drinking water and food for the hard-working volunteers. The wood chips are either kept by property owners or used elsewhere in the community for gardens and pathways. All donations to the association are used for training and the purchase of up-graded fire fighting and first-responder equipment for the SPVFD, and are tax-deductible! You can donate your clean, return-for-deposit bottles and cans to the Ships Point fire hall to help support this effort.

Here's a brief update about the recent goings-on with the Fanny Bay Canine Companionship Park (FBCCP)



The FBCCP Committee has been hard at work securing contractors, volunteers and supplies for the park. As some might recall, the Fanny Bay Community Association secured a grant through the New Horizons

For Seniors Program earlier this year specifically for a dog park that seniors could help plan and eventually use.

The area designated is a large grassy area with some mature trees that provide shade and a natural playground for dogs. The committee determined through research and site visits to other dog parks that it can be

advantageous to have an area for big and little dogs to play. You can choose to divide the space in half.

As some of you may have noticed, we now have a chain-link enclosure with gates. Although not formally open, we are pleased to see residents are already enjoying the park.





Committee members, Suzanne, Anne and Vanessa, are sourcing out dog bag stations. Wendy and Lynne are working with a local sign maker to determine the correct signage, in terms of both the 'user guidelines', to help ensure everyone uses the park as it is intended, as well as placement. Behind the scenes, Keir and Tammy have been meeting with and arranging with local contractors for ground preparation, fence construction and next big to-do item - the two shelters (one on each side of the dividing fence) that dog

owners can use to stay warm and dry in while their fury babies frolic.

We are pleased to report that two local builders will be leading this next phase. In the coming weeks, expect to see construction in the area, so there may be times when the enclosure is not accessible. Thank you for your interest, we look forward to announcing a grand opening date soon!

In pre-Christian times in northern Europe and Asia, the collection, preparation, and use of fly agaric mushrooms was central to many winter solstice celebrations and ceremonies. Although many dispute the theory, some believe these mushrooms were the inspiration for Santa Claus and other Christmas traditions, because Siberian shamans would give out bags of the red and white fungi, which often grow under evergreen trees, as presents in late December. Going even further, some folklorists believe that flying reindeer may have originated

#### **Water Conservation**

The Board of Trustees thanks residents for their water conservation efforts this summer as we introduced new Water Conservation Guidelines. While summer weather was much cooler and slightly wetter than in recent years, we had experienced a winter drought due to El Niño conditions, which reduced the volume of precipitation recharging our aquifer overall. After moderate rainfall totals over the summer months, the province reduced the drought level on East Vancouver Island to normal as of September 19, and SPID has returned to Stage 1 guidelines. However, please bear in mind that a few weeks of rain may not be sufficient to recharge our aquifer after months of fairly dry weather. We ask residents to continue to be mindful of their water use, and while conservation measures are not in effect at the moment, please do everything possible to minimize waste of this precious resource.

#### ROUBLE IS IN THE PATH UP AHEAD AND SO WE HAVE TO WAIT

Trouble is a black bear who lives in the Morrison Creek the low flow rates we have in Mud Bay watershed. She was named by a local property owner, not for the trouble she causes but for the trouble she's seen in her young bear's life. I'm here following Jim Palmer, a member of there?) that installing the weir can be the Morrison Creek Streamkeepers, on his rounds and getting some hands-on training in stream flow measurement. Jim has been using a different flow measuring strategy than ours with weir against the downstream face of a culvert. This is relatively much success. But right now he's yelling politely at Trouble, trying to cajole her into heading off into the woods and out of our path. But she's having none of it. She's turned sideways in the path but her big head is swung around to face us. Now she's started making a huffing sound which puts me in mind of charging bear videos I've seen online. But soon her stubbornness is explained: a cub comes clambering out of the brush next to her and they both waste no time loping off in the other direction. As we pass the spot where the cub had appeared we can see a path down to the stream where pinks are jostling about. We had interrupted the bears' lunch.

The method of streamflow measurement that Jim is demonstrating for me today involves a temporary dam across the stream with a V shape cut out of it. It's called a V-notch weir. Once the weir is installed, the water begins to back up behind it and the water flows over the notch, filling more and more of the V. Eventually the level reaches a state of equilibrium. At that point, the height of the water above the



bottom of the V is measured and plugged into a formula which calculates the amount of water flowing. This method seems quite attractive to me compared to our fussy DYI FlowStick which requires a reading every 20 cm across the width of the

stream. And it is far more accurate at Creek and Cowie Creek. The downside is (there's always a downside, isn't quite a bit of work.



In one small tributary of Morrison Creek Jim and I install the simple. We line up some bolts and tighten them then wait til the water reaches equilibrium. It takes about fifteen minutes.

The next location is harder. There is no culvert and one side of the channel is bounded by a fairly porous chunk of rotting cedar. We use a with а tarp attached. The tarp is laid out upstream weighted down



sandbags. Then the weir is tipped up into place and the excitement begins. The rising water pushes the weir and bellies the tarp out against the banks. We race to keep the weir perpendicular and straight. At the same time, we race to keep the water from washing away the banks and creating new renegade channels. But eventually we corral all the leaks and get the weir properly aligned. While we wait for the water to stop rising, Jim and I quickly eat the lunch we brought along.

Eventually the water quits rising and we take our measurements. Dismantling the weir and associated tarps is easy but we do it slowly so as to not inundate downstream organisms with a flood. This has been a great outing and I've learned a lot. The hike back to the car is leisurely and uneventful. There is no Trouble.


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

# A BOUT 5000 YEARS AGO, SCIENCE TELLS US, THE WEST COAST ASSUMED PRETTY MUCH

the shape we know today, the icecaps had gone, and the salmon were coming to streams like the one that became Rosewall Creek. *Oncorhynchus kisutch,* the coho, could be on its 1500<sup>th</sup> generation arriving here this Autumn - they know the way. One of the ways we identify fish is named Adam Vojnic. He's a stream-walker

from Courtenay and he knows his fish. On September 30th, Adam checked Rosewall Creek from the estuary to the upstream park boundary for us and found 60 coho. On October 13th, 129 coho, as well as 80 jacks (two year old males) 27 Chum, 3 Pinks and 3 Chinook were counted. Those last two trios are strays; they took a wrong turn. So the spawning run is well under way, as is all the work at the hatchery; the fish ladder is in, all our egg-take and bacterial kidney disease (BKD) testing gear assembled, the incubation room newly refinished and watertight, the creek is high and fast with the latest rain, and fish are finding their way to our brood channel.

Because we never want just one big job going on at a time, we also clip our brood stock in October and November, taking off adipose fins so that lucky fishermen can keep the hatchery fish they catch. That's after we've gone to all the work of raising eggs to smolt stage and sending them out into the wild with serious advice about avoiding shiny objects and juicy looking hoochies. This year, we have 'only' 23,350 coho fry to clip, because of our high losses to BKD in this brood. All the eggs we take are kept separate until the tests on the kidneys of their mothers are back—and anything infected has to be destroyed.

The other job completed last month was returning all our rescued fry to their natal streams to enjoy the reality show that is life in the wild. For our little competitors, getting off the island alive is winning—and then you have to stay alive out there in the Strait. Yet another job—we keep busy—is potting up our donated silviculture 'plugs' into gallon pots for later use in the environmental restoration projects we're big on. Reforesting around the Mackenzie Overpass in Victoria will use 100 of those pots, and another 100 to McNaughton Creek's new side channel area. FBSES has just had 300 spruce donated by Mosaic, the forest products company, and 300 cedars from BC Timber Sales; we aren't going to run out.

While FBSES is all-volunteer, some things need money. One of the best sources of it is the Pacific Salmon Foundation and its annual dinners every fall all over the Island and rest of BC. Chaired again this year by Fanny Bay's own Judy Ackinclose, Courtenay's sold out dinner, live and silent auctions and dance raised \$51,000 for Comox Valley enhancement groups, and sold out 2020's dinner as well.
