





UE TO AN UNSEASONABLY COOL AND WET SPRING,

Ships Point remains at Water Conservation Stage 1 and Fire Danger Level 1 at the time of publishing. This is highly unusual and could change quickly as we head into fire season. Permits are required for yard waste burning and for campfires in homemade fire pits and commercially available wood burning devices. CSA and ULC approved gas fire appliances are allowed without a permit. A reminder that beach fires are NOT allowed anywhere or at any time of year within Ships Point. In the coming days, please monitor the SPID entrance board for changes to the Water Conservation Stage and the current Fire Danger Rating. As well, up to date information is always available on the SPID website at SPID.ca.

WATER SERVICE BOXES AND FIRE HYDRANTS are installed on public property and need to remain visible and accessible to water and fire personnel. You can help with this by familiarizing yourself with the locations of the service boxes and hydrants nearest to your property and ensuring that plants, trees or structures on your property do not limit clear access. Avoid planting trees and other vegetation within 1.5 metres (5 feet) in any direction of a hydrant and ensure that gravel, wood chips and other landscaping materials aren't spread over tops of service boxes. More detailed information can be found at SPID.ca under General Info-Bylaws-Bylaw 108.

After struggling with the damp weather and abundance of slugs, trying every method of protecting my gardens from beer traps to oyster shells to copper, I finally broke down and bought the most adorable little ducklings that apparently will end my slug battles! Not just any type of duck, these Cayuga ducklings are very rare and have a striking black appearance, with an iridescent sheen in the light similar to the green eye of a peacock's feather. I have had four little pure black pairs of webbed feet waddling behind me for the last couple of weeks, learning the lay of the land.

Our new farm hands are listed as "Threatened" on the American Livestock Breed's Conservation Priority List as there are fewer than 1000 breeding birds in the US, and they are globally endangered. Cayuga ducks have a mysterious background, with various theories of their origin, including being developed from a pair of wild ducks in 1809 in New York, but the story turned out to be inaccurate and lacking scientific evidence.

Another version was that they originated from the English Black duck of Lancashire, a breed that soon disappeared afterwards. The ducks were names "Cayuga" after the native people in the area. By 1874 the Cayuga duck was accepted into the Standard of Perfection as a recognized breed by the American Poultry Association. They started being exported to the United Kingdom in 1851, and were added to the British Standard in 1901. They were primarily raised for meat until 1890 when it was replaced by the American Pekin, and they have since been raised for shows and ornamental additions on farms.

The Cayuga duck is regarded as one of the hardiest duck breeds and easily tamable if hand raised. They are true black, with black feet, legs and bills, which is the result of a genetic mutation. They lay an average of 100-150 eggs per year, which are laid as black early in the season, and lighten to almost white throughout the summer.

One of the quietest ducks, Cayuga's only quack when then need food or get separated from their flock. They also have funny personalities and are very sociable. This makes them amazing livestock for training herding dogs, as they are quiet and oblige with any direction given. In fact, Cayuga ducks have often been raised specifically to train herding dogs as they are easier to manage than sheep, but will aid in training a canine to effective herd any animal.

Our Border Collie is thrilled with the new task of taking care of the ducks, and she has been learning how to steer them to where she wants them to go. She has an amazing temperament and has been helping me raise baby chicks and turkey poults for four years, but this is the first animal she had that will follow her, so she is very curious about these new additions. I look forward to training her to protect the ducks from predators, herding them away from any danger, and having her help me to train them to keep close.

River the Border Collie is so excited about her new job and the little Cayuga's have really taken to her. We go on small walks daily so that they get settled into their environment, and they run – pitter patter, pitter patter everywhere we go. They are still on small foods which need to be finely chopped, but I am anxiously waiting for when they can chomp down the Fanny Bay slugs. Sometimes living wild means bringing in much needed additional resources for balance!



#### NE OF OUR FAVOURITE FISH EXPERTS

is postdoctoral researcher at University of Victoria Department of Biology and Pacific Salmon Foundation Will Duguid, who is also a great source of encouragement for all of us. One of Will's projects is the British Columbia Adult Chinook and Coho Salmon Diet Program. It uses Citizen Science in the form of fishers who get the stomach and intestines of their catches to him - more than 4000 since 2017 - and he analyses what they've been eating. In our area 14 as defined by the fishing regulations, 86% of a Chinook's diet is herring, year-round. This is not surprising to one of the contributors, FBSES volunteer Bruce Shearer of Royston. Bruce has sent in between 30 and 40 of those stomachs. He is an enthusiastic recreational fisher and says, "its important to give back to the ocean" and since he began volunteering, "karma is working, my catch rate has gone up." Bruce follows the results of the study and is into it to the point of collecting stomachs at cleaning tables to add to the numbers and the coverage in Port McNeill and Barkley Sound. "Anything we can do is all to the good" when aiding science and enhancement, Bruce says, and he proves it regularly with FBSES. Lots more detail and information are available via Google and the annual report of the study may tell you more than you want to know about analysing stomach contents. Start with Adult Chinook and Coho Salmon Diet Program.

Just down the road from Fanny Bay lies Deep Bay, not the centre of the universe like our home here, but nice enough. And another place where your favourite environmental stewards, the Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society, cares for the streams and their fishes. Starting in 1994, we have done habitat and in-stream projects in and around Deep Bay Creek to try to preserve and aid its struggling population of Coho. They need help because even though the creek runs for much of its 1214-meter length through Deep Bays' RDN regional park, it also must navigate two culverts and an open stretch without any cover that runs through the Deep Bay Motel grounds. It empties into the bay through a tidal estuary that predators find
