EMBERS LAST MET ON THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 2ND

BAYNES SOUND GARDEN CLUB

The feature speaker for the evening was our favourite bug expert, Bonnie Zand, who lives right here in Fanny Bay!

Bonnie's topic was "Gardening for bees: supporting BC's diverse native bees." Bonnie is the project lead for the Vancouver Island Pests, Pollinators And Beneficials Project (VIPPB) which monitors and gathers data on BC"s pests and beneficial insects in order to build a knowledge baseline. There are more than 450 different bee species in BC and they are incredibly diverse in size, appearance and lifestyle, and all are vitally important for pollination of both food crops and wild plants.

As always, Bonnie's presentation was fascinating. She led us through the many types of bees, from the big bumblebees we'll be seeing any day

now as spring approaches, to tiny carpenter bees which are black with a blue or green cast and look like small ants or flies at first glance. We also learned about generalist bees (they get their pollen from any species of plant) and specialist bees (you guessed it - they get pollen from a single group of plant species). We also heard tales of "single mom" bees, lazy male bees, and solitary and social bees, as well as a myriad of other tidbits about bees too numerous to list here!

And how are BC's bees doing? Well, about 35% of BC's bee species have a vulnerable or worse status and the rest are unknown, hence the need for the VIPPB project. Bonnie's advice to us was "Go forth and advocate for the bees!" She suggested creating habitat in our yards, i.e. nesting habitat (leave the leaves and logs), year round blooms, avoiding pesticides in our gardens, and purchasing organic food whenever possible.

At the conclusion of her talk, Bonnie was

presented with a donation to the very worthwhile VIPPB project (see photo). For more information about the project and to sign up for their newsletter, visit



ELP REMOVE EVIL PLANTS FROM OUR PARKS Hi, I'm Kathryn. Many of you may not know me because my husband, Lee, and I moved full-time to Fanny Bay just when the COVID-19 lockdowns went into effect. We live at the south end of Baynes Drive and our property backs on to a hidden gem called Baynes Park. But this little park is in big trouble because it is overrun

with English Ivy. In fact, it is so thick with ivy that you can't even access the park.

How did these plants get here and why is it import to remove them? An invasive or alien species is an introduced species that becomes overpopulated and harms its new environment. Invasive species adversely affect habitats and bioregions, causing ecological, environmental, and economic damage.

Invasive plants are distributed in many ways: by people, birds, wind, and rodents. In a recent correspondence with Daniel May, Senior Parks Technician at the Comox Valley Regional District, he said: "Baynes Park definitely has a high density of invasives for the size of the park. I have been in there in the past and it is clear that, historically, most if not all of the invasives were introduced to the forest by garden clippings being dumped over the fence from private residences."

Many people think invasive plants are weeds such as dandelions and bindweed but most prolific invasive plants started out in our gardens or as houseplants. In a recent walk in Baynes Park I counted at least six introduced species including Daphne (spurge laurel), common periwinkle, and English holly. The Daphne is especially a concern because, like Scotch broom, it has very deep roots and is extremely difficult to remove once the plant has established itself.

Other parks in Fanny Bay have similar problems with invasive species. I want to do something about this, and I could really use your help. With teams of volunteers we can remove as many of

these plants as possible over the next month. The plan is to concentrate on two parks - Baynes Park and the beachside park off Wente Way - and complete the work before spring growth begins.

These two are just the start. Together we can help Fanny Bay parks retain their natural ecosystems. Even if you can only spare an hour or two, every little bit will help.

I turn to my pantry for dried fruits and nuts to make Granola. I love to eat this crunchy treat for breakfast or a snack. It is great on yogurt, cereal, smoothie bowls, in muffins. A favourite way to enjoy it is to sprinkle in a few chocolate chips and eat it as trail mix.

As the seasons change, so does my granola. In the winter

months I prefer dried cranberries, figs, and dates. A summer granola can be filled with dried berries, mangoes and apricots.

Changing the spice blends can further enhance granola. Try apple pie spice, pumpkin pie spice, chai spice or gingerbread spice. Personalizing granola to your own taste is the best part of making it yourself.



In a large bowl, combine:

1/2 cup of ground almonds
1/2 cup roughly chopped almonds
3/4 cup cashews
1 1/2 cups rolled oats
1 cup dried cranberries
1/2 cup pumpkin seeds
1/4 cup sunflower seeds
1/2 cup of coconut
2 tsp. cinnamon

In a smaller bowl, combine:

1/3 cup maple syrup (or honey or agave)1/3 cup melted coconut oil (or preferred fat)2 tsp. vanilla

Add the liquid ingredients to the dry, and stir well. Turn out on a large, lined baking sheet. Bake for 20 min. at 275F, rotate pan and bake for 20 min. more until golden.

Let cool on a wire rack and break into pieces. If adding chocolate, sprinkle it over the cooling granola. (Pictured with white chocolate chips).





BWS has been searching for a home for our data that would make it more accessible to the wider world. Our criteria included a secure, stable website that would display the data and allow researchers to download datasets. Further, the site must adhere to open data standards. This means the data can be used by anyone, without restrictions or costs. We recently found a site that meets our requirements. We are now in the process of formatting and uploading our precious data. The website is called DataStream and it is run by the Gordon Foundation, "a charitable organization dedicated to protecting Canada's water and empowering Canada's North". The DataStream platform is billed as "open access and built with communities, policymakers and researchers in mind." Their mission is to "promote knowledge sharing and advance collaborative water stewardship". While we are sold on DataStream, we aren't the only ones. The federal government, several provincial governments, including BC, and many stewardship groups, large and small, are using DataStream for publishing environmental data.



Other funding for projects comes from places not got a donation of large rocks from Rosewall Pit and window directly created for the survival of the environment, but like all of us, certainly affected by it. BC's Ministry of Transportation has policy guidelines that specify "no net loss" of habitat here on the Rosewall. For example, Mosaic Forest Managefrom their projects, and over the years, FBSES and MOT have worked together in restoring salmon streams affected by roads. This goes back to 1997, when Inland Island Highway construction washouts destroyed Cook Creek spawning beds and most recently the restoration of the McNaughton Creek culvert failure that cut Highway 19A for two months in 2019. Another example helps make the point, our Wilfred Creek Hatchery.

It started small, and by accident was built on private land stuff happens—that belonged to what is now Mosaic Forest Management. Who are major supporters of us and our work there and continue to be, most recently with a \$5000 grant. Hatcheries like Wilfred could be a dictionary example of the term 'high maintenance' and the forthcoming project we have for it will be supported by Mosaic for their own good reasons as well as ours. For all of us, it's because of the need to restore, enhance and encourage the salmon resource that we all value.

Donations and grants are earned not only by detailed applications for worthwhile projects that can be justified and show results, they're also supported by our efforts before, during and after. Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society volunteers spend hours in fun stuff like working in creek beds with shovels and even more time in meetings and on the phone.

Unpaid volunteer time on the ground is valued at \$15 an hour by granting agencies (\$25/hour for paperwork/ administration,) who are getting a good return for their investments, as they should.

Department of Fisheries and Oceans provides the legal, scientific, and permitting foundations of all volunteer salmonid enhancement groups. In our case also the site for the Rosewall Hatchery, and essentials like water and power as well as security and technical support with a small annual grant.
