> Scrape filling into desired greased dish(es). I love using a bundt pan. Bake at 350F for 1 hour until browned and a toothpick comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes. Then loosen edges and invert on a baking rack - leave to cool completely before frosting.

If making a double layer cake in 2 pans, baking time is approx. 35 minutes. A 13"x9" slab cake would take around 40 minutes. Cupcakes 20-25 minutes depending on size.

Finally, after a three-hour rainstorm, the sky opened, and the bushes began to shake them







> March 20th is an early first day of Spring, as typically it is March 21st. In 2020 we had the earliest first day of Spring in 124 years, as the first day of Spring actually fell on March 19th! There are several factors that affect the actual date of the first day of Spring, including the number of days in a year, the gravitational pull from other planets and the change in orientation in the Earth's orbit. Also, a year does not have an even number of days and seasons also do not always have an even number of days.

> The vernal equinox is used to determine Easter as well, which you may have noticed moves around each year! In the year of 325, it was decided by the Council of Nicaea that Easter would be held on the first Sunday following the first full moon occurring either on or after the vernal equinox. This year the full moon after the vernal equinox is on April 6th, so Easter is on April 9th.

> The only other planet affected by the equinox phenomenon is Saturn, though few and far between. Saturn has an equinox every spring and fall, but with the seasons being much longer (years) than on Earth, they occur approximately only once every 15 Earth years! The next one is expected to occur on May 6th, 2025.

> On a more magical note, there is a famous tale from Spanish mythology of 6 inch tall fairies that care for the forests. They help those who get lost in the woods, help injured animals and they are capable of communicating through water. On the night of the vernal equinox, they dance all night long scattering roses around them until the dawn. Anyone fortunate enough to find a rose with green, blue, purple or golden petals is said to be granted happiness for the rest of their life.

moments. In the safety of our incubatortrays, our brood stock eggs develop in the same way, under the watch of Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society volunteers. Egg development is measured in 'degree days' - water temperature totalled every 24 hours - until approximately 250 when the first eyes can be seen. Their invisibility under the "redd,' the mound of streambed gravel which hides them, is the wild salmon eggs' only hope to survive just to the first step in their growth. That first stretch of time is dangerous to both wild-spawned and hatchery salmon - they must be untouched, unmoved, until the fertilization process has completed inside the yolk - then in the hatchery we can begin their care routine with a process known as 'shocking'. Not a high-tech activity - it is a pour of two feet from one tray to another that cues a colour change in the egg. If fertilization failed, the egg has died. Viable fertilized eggs are frozen pea sized, a healthy glowing pink with two dark spots, dead, it is a cue-ball hard, pink-tinted white. In the hatchery, it is picked out of the tray by a volunteer using a pair of simple tongs, counted, and eventually composted. In nature, the process is less personal.

But the counting is a very typical hatchery thing, important to us, unknown to the fish. We keep track of our population by volume -100 of the eggs of each tray are weighed, then the whole tray, and that weight is divided by the first, then multiplied by 100 - and Bruce, there it is, the number of eggs. It works. Today, we have 50,398 eggs growing in trays. In a year, when we adipose fin-clip these same

24/7 under running water, until they become alevins. Alevins are hatched fish that still have some of their egg sacs attached until they are 'buttoned up' -smooth fish shapes without any sacs - and then are 'fry.' As fry, they are moved to their next living areas, our larger growing-on tanks, and are introduced to solid food, also with the intensive involvement of volunteers. Most of us can remember the joys of introducing solid foods to little mouths, but that can wait, usually until April. In the meantime, that is how we spent our January, February and March.

Something else to look forward to our River Never Sleeps Festival, May, 7th.

Even though it took two years to write and publish the results, not unusual for scientific papers, the conclusions were available to us right away. This means that when the University of Victoria folks visited us for a second year of measurements it was, as the summary says, "to contribute to mapping of significant aquifers in areas of the Beaufort Watersheds", not just to validate the technique.
