



This time of year, there are often dead salmon on the banks, dragged out of the creek by bears. Once, as we came around a bend in the stream, we scared an eagle off a carcass. We witnessed the awe-inspiring sight of the great bird flying straight towards us and then up and over our heads, the sound of its wings full in our ears.

Our path was tracked by a GPS recorder, and this allowed us to create an updated map of the creek. Existing provincial maps were created in 1998 using aerial imagery and things have changed a lot since then. We noted two new side channels in the creek and a large mid-channel gravel bar.

But what made this outing truly special was that we remembered what it felt like when we first started this crazy project. Just six short years ago.





COAST KITCHEN Cranberry Orange Bars

Fall is in the air as the nights get cooler, the leaves change colour and apples are everywhere. The warm spice of ginger makes these cranberry orange bars fill your home with the scents of the season. Pack them in a lunch box or serve with coffee/tea. Cut them into triangles and present them as part of your thanksgiving desserts. The icing can be topped with a sprinkle of dried cranberries and a drizzle of white chocolate to dress them up.

In a large mixing bowl, beat together:

- 1 cup of melted butter
- 1.5 cups of brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon grated orange zest
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

In a medium bowl, whisk together:

- 2 cups flour
- 1 heaped teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

Add the dried ingredients to the wet. Stir in:

- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- 3/4 cup dried cranberries

Spread mixture out in a 13x9" rimmed cooking sheet lined with parchment paper. Bake at 350F for 20 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

ICING

- 1 block (8 oz) of cream cheese
- 1.5 cups of icing sugar sifted for no clumps
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon orange zest
- 1/2 teaspoon dried cranberries

Beat together cream cheese & icing sugar. Then add rest of ingredients. Beat together until smooth.

Spread icing on cooled bars. Top with extra dried cranberries & drizzle with melted white chocolate if desired. Cool in fridge for 1 hour to make cutting easier. Cut into triangles, store in refrigerator.

Note: for thicker bars, use a 13x9" pan, and increase baking time by 2 minutes.
