


We look forward to welcoming you to the annual Christmas Market at the Fanny Bay Community Hall on Nov. 18th -19th.

Yard Waste Burning and the Ventilation Index:

Effective October 15, the Fire Danger Rating dropped to LOW and backyard burning restrictions were lifted on Ships Point. While permits are not required at this time, for those who choose to burn yard waste, local and provincial regulations must be followed. A critical factor for protecting air quality

during open burning is the province's Ventilation Index. The Ventilation Index forecasts local weather patterns that indicate whether smoke will disperse or remain trapped at ground level. BC restricts outdoor burning when the index is POOR



Besides the six clippers who line the sides of the table, there are movers, flippers and counters. The flipper dispenses the fish from a holding tank to individual bowls via a net on the end of a longish pole - the flip puts the fish out of the net into the bowls.

movers schlep the buckets of fish to the tank, counters click on every single clipped fish. As the crew, locals and "guests", settle into a routine efficient morning, conversation tends to decline to repeated "fish please" calls as bowls of groggy fish get trimmed. Slowed down to handling speed by a simple anaesthetic, they get dipped out, snipped, and dropped into a channel to another fish tank at a rate that adds up to an average 6,380 a day. That kind of rate is necessary to wind up with 44,702 keepers and it meant everyone got the scheduled Friday off.

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

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

EAUFORT WATERSHED STEWARDS (BWS)

There are many ways to measure things. As discussed last Earth and Ocean Sciences Departmonth, you can measure the height of water with a pressure ment to map local aquifers. Using a gauge. You can also measure salinity with an electric current. technique called Vertical Electrical

Living so close to the ocean, we worry about saltwater Sounding, the resistivity of geological seeping into wells. Indeed, we have data that shows well levels rising and falling slightly, in sync with the tides. It is easy to imagine such wells increasing in salinity.

Salinity is not easily measured outside of the lab. But salinity is closely related to Total Dissolved Solids (TDS) and TDS is directly related to conductivity, the ability of a substance to pass a current. So, we take monthly samples from most of the wells in our groundwater monitoring program. A small handheld instrument measures the conductivity of each sample and, over time, gives us an idea of whether or not conductivity, and therefore salinity, is increasing.

Conductivity is one of the parameters we measure in our stream sampling program. In different creeks we see between 16 and 340 uS/Cm. This range represents normal seasonal variation. But in this context – surface water - conductivity tells us nothing about saltwater incursion. The conductivity of ground water, on the other hand, is the main parameter for assessing saltwater incursion. In the wells we monitor, conductivity varies between 50 and 200 uS/cm with no obvious seasonal patterns. The Province considers well water with levels above 1000 uS/cm to be affected by saltwater incursion. None of our wells, no matter how close to the ocean, gets anywhere near this level. More importantly, we've seen no rising trends. Conductivity doesn't seem to be increasing in any of our monitored wells.

The opposite of conductivity is resistivity. One of our big projects has been working with University of Victoria students in the

This work has allowed us, in a few small areas, to show where the saltwater/freshwater boundary actually lies. Our plans include monitoring these areas for changes in the boundary's location.

Rising sea levels and changing rainfall patterns have the potential to throw a salty wrench in things, but for the moment, our studies show no reason for concern. You can thank electricity - both conductivity and resistivity - for helping us bring you this welcome news.


HE STANLEY STORIES CHARGE OF THE TURKEY BRIGADE

Date Balls A South African Sweet

With the festive season approaching, this delicious treat utilizes some dried fruit and pantry items.

It is an easy and economical item to add to your seasonal baking.



- 125g or 1/2 cup of butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 250g of dates, chopped (I slice each date in 4 you can also use scissors!)
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1 package of Maria biscuits crumbled NOT crushed

(At the import aisle of the grocery store or even in the dollar store)

1 tsp vanilla Coconut for rolling them in

In a large pot on the stove, melt the butter and sugar together until smooth. Stir in the dates. Remove from heat and cool, this also helps the dates soften. Add in the egg and vanilla, stirring well, and then the cookies. Start with 3/4 package, adding in more until you get a consistency that will let you form balls.

Do this with your hands or a mini scoop. Make them any size you like, I like little ones, made by about a TB measuring spoon. Now roll them in the coconut, place on a cookie sheet and chill. They get a nice crunch to them. by Marietjie Coast
