
The CVRD and the Fanny Bay Salmon Enhancement Society for their financial support, we navigated the removal in time for the Christmas Market.



Wishing you and your loved ones a Merry Christmas filled with love, laughter, and the warmth of community.



#### EW FROM TWO

As we all know, salmon come back to their natal streams, and it is believed, even to the spot they were hatched described simply, it ain't in the stream. Our hatchery stock come straight home when it's their turn, but we tell them to get their own place, we are taking in the neighbours' kids. Which is to say, we want the wild fish of Rosewall to sire the next generation of our fish. That explains why some of our most physical work in spawning season is putting fish back. Our brood channel and fish ladder have been thronged in 2023, one of the best years of the last decade for returns. On five separate days we have had 'sorts' where we have dealt with hundreds of fish, returning the clipped hatchery stock to the creek, saving the wild - they still have their identifying adipose fin, remember - for eventual egg take and fertilization.



Hatchery and wild Coho are held for sorting in a fish ladder channel at the FBSES site. Photo by Shaun Gray


One of the other ways we collect wild fish is seine netting in the creek. We find Coho schooling in deeper spots along the watercourse, letting us do 'sets' on them. Seining uses a net weighted at the bottom with a lead line, floating on plastic balls at the surface. Getting that net into position needs good swimmers in full body dry suits, which let their users stand the five degree Celsius water temperature, manoeuvre the net, and then bring it to shore full of candidates for brood stock.

Tsable River, but there is also Apple-Cherry and Bob and Steele and Sandy and Big Bear and others out there, little creeks that are more important than you think to the survival of Coho and Chum. And it's our job at FBSES to take care of them. Caring starts with knowing, and we need to know more about the small streams so we can defend their existence. As our president, Judy Ackinclose, says "Who knows how many fish use these creeks to call home?" Fanny Bay members are now being recruited to assist our two pros' in watercourse mapping: filling in the blanks as to what fish habitat we have and to identify restoration sites to help support our fish" in Arin's words. The more help they get, the farther the money goes, too. And if you'd like to spend a few days being trained in GPS software and learning Sensitive Habitat Inventory Mapping techniques, along with some healthy outdoor exercise, let us know and you too can belong. FBSES, your local gateway to fun in the environment!

### **Tipping Fee Changes**

Starting January 1st, 2024, solid waste tipping fees at the Comox Valley and Campbell River Waste Management Centres will be increasing to shift costs towards a 'user pay' model in an effort to reduce unnecessary waste going into the landfill. These updates are intended to encourage positive behavioural change aimed at reducing waste, thereby extending the life of the landfill, which ultimately saves money for all taxpayers.

#### Did you know?

Food and yard waste currently make up about 30% of the total waste in Comox Valley and Campbell River landfills.

The Comox Valley Rent Bank is a service that provides financial assistance to qualifying community members who are struggling to pay their rent and are at risk of becoming homeless. Individuals and families who are experiencing housing instability due to a temporary financial setback, can apply for an interest-free loan to pay rent, essential utilities, or a deposit to help secure new housing. Rent banks can also help facilitate access to supports such as financial literacy, debt/credit counselling, landlord-tenant mediation, vocational supports, legal advocacy, and other services that contribute to financial and housing stability.

If you or someone you know is facing temporary housing instability please do not hesitate to reach out!

The Comox Valley Rent Bank would not be possible without the support from local organizations and businesses.

Our rent bank is supported by BC Rent Bank, a project of Vancity Community Foundation funded by the Province of BC.

HE COMOX VALLEY REGIONAL DISTRICT (CVRD) requires all dogs over six months of age to be licenced every year within Electoral Area A - Baynes Sound (except Hornby and Denman Islands), Electoral Area B – Lazo North, and Electoral Area C – Puntledge and Black Creek.

"Dog licencing makes it easier to help locate a lost dog and return them home as quickly as possible"

Licences are valid annually from January 1st until December 31st each year. Residents who live within the City of Courtenay, Town of Comox, and Village of Cumberland must contact their municipal office to obtain their dog licence.

Currently, the cost to licence a spayed or neutered dog in the electoral areas is \$10, and \$25 for a non-spayed or neutered dog. Failure to obtain a dog licence may be subject to a \$100 fine.

#### HE LITTLE BROWN OAP HALL

at the beginning of Ships Point Road has been a fixture of the Fanny Bay community since the 1970's. For most of us, it has just always been there, snug, and quietly tucked away in the trees with its little totem pole and neat little parking lot all set to welcome the next group of folks that call the hall 'theirs' for a little while.

Our Gigantic Garage Sale is the Best in the Valley, you just never know what you are going to find there. Fishing gear, fine China, vintage clothing, retro furniture, door knobs, electrical do-dads, suitcases, picture frames, kitchen appliances, pipes for plumbing, cameras, garden tools, Christmas decorations, lawn mowers, coffee mugs, wine glasses, towels, pins and needles, the most bizarre and unusual curiosities.

If you're hungry there's the concession stand over by the kitchen door with hotdogs and hamburgers ready to go.

The <u>bake sales</u> with their 'second to none', pies, cakes, loaves, squares, cookies, bread, candies and endless other sugary treats.

The Hall is well known for private parties for birthdays, holiday events, memorials and just plain old get togethers.

The rent has always been kept reasonable for the community and the hall warm and inviting.

Therefore we're so very sad to tell community that these days are coming to an end. This lovely spot that we have leased from the Anglican Church for nearly 50 years will be sold to raise funds to finance another project, apparently for senior housing in Courtenay. We have pled our case with the Anglican Church board of directors, Dr. Brendon Neilson, Executive Director specifically, for keeping the property as is.



However, we have met with a very determined group of businesspeople who want to turn it over for a profit and evict the Fanny Bay Senior Society.


This creates a huge dilemma for this senior's group. We do not really fit into the Fanny Bay Hall due to its large size and how busy it is with so many other community programs. The upstairs area is impossible to utilize because of the stairs for people with mobility problems. The dining room too small to seat everyone for our potlucks, the large hall is just too big.

We have been home base for the Fanny Bay Quilt Group for 25 years and have provided storage space for them to keep bins of fabric, rolls of batting and other equipment at the hall. This collection of supplies is used by the guilters to make 'Comfort Quilts' for a variety

#### EAUFORT WATERSHED STEWARDS (BWS)

There is a compound used in the manufacturing of tires that keeps the rubber soft and prevents UV damage. It is also extremely toxic to Coho salmon. (Why only Coho is one of the mysteries). The compound is 6-PPD-Q and researchers have only begun to be aware of it in the last three years.

One could be forgiven for thinking this is a minor problem. Just keep the tires out of the creeks, right? But the reality is that when your mechanic tells you your tire tread is low and you need new tires, it is because the surface of your tires has worn away and the

microscopic bits of rubber were washed by the rain into the nearest creek.

BWS is taking part in an Islandwide effort to understand just how pervasive this pollutant is. The organization leading the project is BC Conservation Foundation (BCCF) in collaboration with Vancouver Island University. (You



can learn more at <a href="www.tireweartoxins.com">www.tireweartoxins.com</a>.) We already work with BCCF, studying flow rates at Cook Creek and Wilfred Creek. Now, several of our volunteers have taken the training for 6-PPD-Q sampling.

Last fall we took the first set of these tire toxin samples from Wilfred Creek, just downstream of the bridge on the lower highway. One sample was taken just before a big rain was predicted; another sample was taken during the rain event itself; and the third sample was taken after the rains had mostly subsided. This year



we are sampling more creeks, more frequently and at various times as the researchers fine tune how to get the best data. In some parts of the Island, where there are more people and more cars, volunteers are sampling hourly. We look forward to seeing the results once the samples have been analyzed and validated and the final report is released.

BWS is not a fish-centric organization. Our focus is drinking water and things that affect its quality or quantity. However, the effects of 6-PPD-Q are still being studied. It has shown toxicity in mice. Its effects on human health are not yet known. The persistence of this pollutant in the environment and its ability to migrate into groundwater are all questions that have not been answered. We are happy to help with this kind of basic science and we're proud that we have the dedicated volunteers who are willing to head into the creeks in the rainiest of weather.

## OAST KITCHEN Orange Pound Cake

This pound cake uses the bounty of oranges we have during the holidays. It can even be made using mandarin oranges. For a stunning dessert at Xmas or new year, layer cubes of pound cake with custard, strawberry jello and canned mandarin oranges in fancy glasses. Top with whipped cream. (Feel free to drizzle some sherry on the cake in the trifles).

1/2 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature1 cup granulated sugar, divided2 eggs1 tsp vanilla

2 TB freshly squeezed orange juice, divided 6 TB buttermilk

grated orange zest from 1 orange 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

Optional Glaze (whisk together).

1 cup confectioners' sugar, sifted

1 1/2 TB freshly squeezed orange juice

Cream butter & sugar. Add in eggs & vanilla. In a separate bowl whisk together dry ingredients.

In a glass measuring cup mix together wet ingredients. Alternate adding the dry and wet ingredients to the creamed mixture. Pour batter into a

parchment lined loaf pan. Bake for 45-50 minutes at 350F.

When cooled drizzle with glaze.

This loaf recipe can be doubled, and freezes well.
