I have chosen Vancouver Island and the supernatural as a theme for this year's Board Buzz. I did not receive any better suggestions, so I ran with the idea. As a reference, I am using Vancouver Island author Shanon Sinn's book "The haunting of Vancouver Island" supernatural encounters with the other side.

The Lady Who Walks on Water, a captivating Vancouver Island ghost story rooted in Port Alberni for over 80 years, features an attractive Indigenous woman clad in colonial attire. Unlike typical Indigenous ghost narratives, this tale challenges stereotypes. Witnesses report sightings along the Paper Mill Dam Park, a scenic spot near the Orange Bridge en route to Tofino. Her apparition is seen on paths, shores, and even walking atop water. Rare in BC ghost lore, she asks, "Have you seen my baby?" This tale, known to both Indigenous and non-Indigenous residents, gained recent attention, suggesting it's not a fabricated tourist attraction. (Page 203)

Thank you for your continued support, and here's to a fantastic year ahead at the Fanny Bay Community Hall!



AT OYSTER WELCOMES AWARD-WINNING WRITERS FROM ACROSS CANADA

Thursday, February 22nd, 7:00pm, at the Fanny Bay Hall. The Fat Oyster Reading Series (FORS) is honored to feature Governor General Award-winning author Joan Thomas. The Winnipeg-based novelist will be reading from her fifth book, Wild Hope, a contemporary story about love, food, art, and ambition in a swiftly changing world.

Her previous novel, Five Wives, based on an ill-fated missionary endeavour in Ecuador in 1956, won the Governor General's Award for Fiction in 2019. Joan's earlier work was nominated for the Giller Prize, the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award, and the Margaret Laurence Award, and won a Commonwealth Prize for Best First Book, to name a few.

Montral author **Anita Anand** will be reading from her Ippy Gold Metal-winning book, Convergence of Solitudes, a story of identity, connection and forgiveness that shares the lives of two families across Partition of India, Operation Babylift in Vietnam, and two referendums in Quebec. The recipient of numerous awards, Anand both writes original work and translates books into English.

Leading off the evening and just in time for herring season,

local writer Dave Flawse will be sharing, 1979, a true story about the year gold swam in BC waters- when herring gillnetters walked down local docks with \$100,000 in plastic bags, and how it all came crashing down.

Flawse writes at the intersection of history, local interest for a selection of BC magazines. He is regularly published in the BC Review for analysis of Canadian literature and is the publisher of VancouverIslandHistory.com.


IVE MUSIC AT THE FANNY BAY HALL

EBRUARY 29TH, A DAY THAT ONLY APPEARS ON THE CALENDAR EVERY FOUR YEARS

This makes 2024 a leap year.

Here's why we do this. The Earth takes 365.24219 days to travel around the sun. That extra .24 days may seem small, but since calendars only have 365 days. That means that every



year we get just a little knocked off the timing of the seasons, by about 6 hours every year. So to prevent Halloween from happening in say the middle of winter, we add a leap day every four years. This allows farmers to set regular days for sowing the fields and harvesting the crops.

It helps everyone else have regular seasons and for those born on a leap year, many just celebrate it every year on Feb. 28th or March 1st.

We have Julius Caesar and his Julian calendar to thank for the leap day starting in 45 BC. But even with the addition of leap years, the calendar still isn't perfectly aligned with the Earth's orbit around the sun.

In 1582, people began to notice that the calendar was off by 10 days. That's when Pope Gregory the 13th established the Gregorian calendar and deleted three leap days every 400

That's why there was no leap day in 1700, 1800, and 1900, but there was one in 2000 and there won't be one in 2100.

Leap year people are called Leapings or Leapers! There's a Leap year cocktail! Gin, vermouth and Grand Marnier, something to look forward to once every 4 years!



of that month this year and it is also Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society's The River Never Sleeps Festival day. It's the time our brood stock for the year go out into the world. Many of them get carried by kids and grownups in our bucket brigade, and the rest go out through our fish ladder under the eyes of the crowd as the big finish of the days' events. The child will watch "his" or "her" fish disappear into the stream, and the fish will start the real-life portion of its existence, striving to survive and return to spawn. The Coho release, with all its meaning, is the centrepiece of our big day, but we surround it with lots of other excitement, like burgers and ice cream and oysters on the barbie, and 40 tents full of exhibitors happy to see you and tell you about their passion for what they do. There were just over 700 of you here last year, and it will start with free admission as always at 10 am.

The River Never Sleeps is one of the fun times of the year for all of us, and if you've considered being part of salmon enhancement, joining us now will put you in a good place for your share of the complements we all receive over the event. We're here for the salmon and we enjoy ourselves doing it, and just showing up is all it takes to get started.

When Doug Barnes, our facilities manager, ordered more topsoil for our tree nursery, he learned that Vancouver Island Enterprises, at the Comox Airport, would be delivering it for no charge, because" the boss wanted it that way, he is a big supporter of salmon enhancement." Thanks to everyone who helps us help salmon.

Right now, at FBSES we have 60,000 Chum salmon eggs rapidly developing into the alevin stage - that's hatching - and 80,347 viable eyed Coho salmon eggs growing, and 44,702 year-old clipped Coho fry rapidly becoming pre-smolt stage fish. And another 43,050 Chum and 2,140 Coho eggs at Wilfred Creek Hatchery. But we really want you to know about two tiny sets of our eggs now sitting snugly in the bottom of incubators in classrooms in Bowser and at Beachcombers Academy on Station Road in Fanny Bay under the watchful eyes of the students. At the Academy, 100 eggs now glow in the kindergarten room in one of the customized aquariums that are supplied by the 'Stream to Sea' program.

And at Bowser Elementary, a set of 200 eggs are under the care of the Grade 4-5 split class and teacher Chloe Kupserschmidt and the experienced guidance of Robert Seline, the retired principal of the school, who returns to assist the



process. DFO supplies schools with equipment (the incubators), teacher resources, and technical assistance. Eggs come from local hatcheries, like us, and educational co-ordinators visit schools, like Sarah Wolfe of Port Alberni, who has 31 tanks in schools in

the Parksville-Comox Valley area.

Raising salmon in elementary schools has been happening off and on for at least thirty years, which is why it may seem

familiar, especially to everyone who had kids or grandchildren, (or was one). In 2017, the whole program nearly died of Ottawa decision making, and was retained, redesigned, and improved, (which was apparently the idea all along of course,) only after a grassroots and national news uproar. Then came Covid and school closures, and only in 2022 was FBSES able to send out eggs again. The classroom incubators have coolers to control egg development, (salmon need cool water, classes learn) and that temperature is tracked daily by the students, who get to practise arithmetic as well as patience until the numbers add up and they see their eggs emerging and growing into fry. Those fry will come back to Rosewall Creek with their young caretakers and teachers and be released just before spring break and we'll be there to help.

MERGENCY PREPAREDNESS ON SHIPS POINT:

"Most initial disaster relief is provided not by formal emergency and relief organizations, but by residents of the

impact area and surrounding communities."

Last summer's wildfires, drought, and extreme heat have

many of us thinking, with some urgency, about our households' and our community's emergency preparedness. Ships Point does not have a dedicated Neighbourhood Emergency and Disaster Preparedness Plan in place. Last year, B.C. passed new Emergency and Disaster Management legislation and the Comox Valley Emergency Management Service launched an updated Neighbourhood Emergency Preparedness Program (NEPP) and Guide. There are now multiple local resources available to B.C. communities for developing a dedicated neighbourhood emergency preparedness plan. (For further information: www.comoxvalleyrd.ca/services/emergencymanagement/emergency-preparedness.) Though outside of SPID's provincial government mandate to provide quality water and fire protection services, we welcome the opportunity to act as liaison for Ships Point residents who wish to volunteer to develop an emergency preparedness plan. One of the first steps to developing a neighbourhood plan is to have a meeting to discuss the unique conditions of our community. (For example, here on Ships Point, we live on a peninsula with one exit road for vehicles.) The idea is that the first meeting

would lead to a leadership team and a basic plan and then follow-up community meetings would lead to a detailed

plan. Will you be the host of that first Ships



PARCEL TAX AND WATER TOLLS:

The 2024 SPID parcel tax and water tolls invoices were mailed out at the end of January. If you haven't received your invoice, please contact the SPID office at shipspt1@shaw.ca. Payments are due at the office by March 31, 2024, in the form of cheque (postdated OK), money order, certified cheque, bank draft and e-transfer. To send an e-transfer: 1. Add SPID as a recipient to your bank/credit union account 2. Email payment to admin@spid.ca. (SPID is set up for automatic deposit so a password is not required) 3. In the message box, enter your Roll #, Invoice #, or street address. Payments received after March 31st will incur 15% late fees. Utility Payment: SPID is listed as a Utility Payee with B.C. credit unions and Canada Western Bank. For those of you with an account at one of these institutions, you can pay using your account's Bill Payment option. The payee is Ships Point Improvement District and the account number is your 3 digit roll number prefaced by the word 'roll' (i.e. ROLLXXX or rollxxx).







EAUFORT WATERSHED STEWARDS (BWS) It is hard to believe that this will be our eighth year of existence as an organization. One more Annual General Meeting is in the books. This year's was held on January 25th. Here are some highlights from our President's Report:

Five-year plan:

This comprehensive document was completely and tabled in early summer 2023. It gives this organization a huge grounding in its decisions on funding projects, documenting activity, visions, and continuity planning moving forward. It has already made the crafting of the 2024 budget a smoother process. It is to be updated annually by the executive to include a full 5year period. Congratulations to all the folks hard work, true vision, and collaboration in taking this maturing step as nonprofit society.

Our next step is to form a "Strategic Planning Subcommittee." This team will work to form a BWS Scientific Advisory Group as a first step.

Sampling:

This entire program expanded in 2023. The Ground Water sampling program increased by five new sensors. The Stream sampling program renamed the North and South Pods to the Royston and Fanny Bay Pod respectfully - primarily due to the planned start of the Bowser Pod in 2024. The expansion of our sampling is moving into the Nanaimo Regional District in the first months of new year. Thanks to Sharon, and Manfred for being the new pod leaders for this area. Also, thanks to Pam to year and many thanks to Lynne for all her time keeping the doing all the groundwork for this this exciting new frontier in another Regional District.

Projects:

A significant achievement this year was BWS's first real science paper, "Evaluating the Use of Electrical Resistivity Sounding to Characterize Aquifers in the Beaufort Watershed, B.C." It was published by the BC Government in their "Water Science Series - De-



cember 2022 edition". A huge congratulations to Mark Lake getting this done, working together with UVic. In addition, Mark and his co-author Mike Wei presented this paper to the Canadian chapter of the International Association of Hydrogeologists at their annual conference in Vancouver in November 2023.

The Tsable River Cumulative Effects (CE) GIS Assessment Project was completed in 2023. This project was funded partly by the CVRD grant and enabled BWS to hire a GIS tech to perform all the hard analysis. The final report was written in Dec 2023 and is published on the BWS website for public review. The overall findings were that the Tsable River watershed has a HIGH risk of being negatively impacted by industrial forest harvesting development – this is significant. The report's findings were presented to the CVRD and all interested parties in Jan 2024.

Communications, Community Outreach and Advocacy:

These activities have increased in volunteer hours from last BWS website first class and leading the many groups of volunteers per event.

Event promotion was busy, for BWS hosted tents and one walk at the following events Fanny Bay Celebrate your Community,

The River Never Sleeps, Earth Day Waterloo Walk, CVCP Family Watershed Day, and Ecole Puntledge Salmon Day.

Partnerships:

In 2023 BWS successfully sponsored a GIS practicum student with VIU - Jake LeBron. For three months Jake worked to assemble a multitude of data, maps, and images to create online interactive maps of the Beaufort Watersheds. He did a great job in setting up our live GIS interactive map on our website for the first time. This project was a test in working with VIU and sponsoring a student. This was lot of work for Mark as the BWS contact and project supervisor, but well worth it thanks to Mark!! As a result, BWS has developed a new partnership with VIU and as a result has applied for a GIS student again for the spring semester of 2024. Projects have been lined up for that timeframe and should produce more valuable products.

WHITE CHOCOLATE BROWNIE

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease a 9 x 9 square pan.

8 ounces of white chocolate (approx 1 cup)

1/2 cup butter

2 eggs

1 TB vanilla extract

1/3 cup white sugar

1 1/4 cup white flour

1/2 tsp fine sea salt

1 cup dark chocolate chunks

OR

1 bar of dark chocolate coarsest chopped

Melt the white chocolate and butter together in the micre wave or double boiler. Cool slightly.

Whisk eggs until foamy. Add in vanilla, sugar & salt. Slowly pour the chocolate mixture into the egg mixture, whisking constantly. Now fold in the flour, then the dark chocolate.

Pour into baking pan, baking approx. 25 minutes. Cool slightly on wire rack before cutting & serving.
