



This album is nominated in the Global Roots Album of the Year category at the 2024 Canadian Folk Music Awards. Praised in Songlines Journal as a 'splendid debut album - rich and lyrical' playing.

LEASE HELP SAVE THE OAP HALL

You are going to find my OAP flyer report oddly familiar this time around. I submitted this one in December when we were given the news from the Anglican Church Diocese in Victoria about their plan to sell The OAP Hall at 418 Ships Point Road. We have since then asked the CVRD to purchase the property. It seems appropriate to send it out again to remind everyone just how important this little hall is to this community now that the FOR-SALE sign is up.

The Little Brown OAP Hall has been a fixture of the Fanny Bay community since the '70's. For most of us, it's just always been there, snug, and quietly tucked away in the trees with its little totem pole and neat little parking lot all set to welcome the next group of folks that call the hall 'theirs' for a little while.

Our annual Gigantic Garage Sale is the best in the valley, you just never know what you're going to find there. Fishing gear, fine China, vintage clothing, retro furniture, doorknobs, electrical do-dads, suitcases, picture frames, kitchen appliances, pipes for plumbing, cameras, garden tools, Christmas decorations, lawn mowers, coffee mugs, wine glasses, towels, pins and needles, the most bizarre and unusual curiosities. All proceeds from this sale are used to keep the hall maintained and functioning. During the sale, if you're hungry there's the concession stand over with hotdogs and hamburgers ready to go. The bake sales are second to none featuring pies, cakes, loaves, squares, cookies, bread, candies, and endless other sugary treats.

The OAP Hall is well known for private parties for birthdays, holiday events, memorials and just plain old get togethers. The rent has always been kept reasonable for the community and he hall warm and inviting.

Therefore, we are incredibly sad to tell community that these days could be coming to an end. The OAP has leased this lovely spot from the Anglican Church and completely

funded and maintained it for nearly 50 years. Now it is to be sold to raise funds to finance a project of theirs; development of a property in Victoria and upgrading their cathedral. We have pled our case with the Anglican Church board of directors, Dr. Brendon Neilson, Executive Director in particular, for keeping the property as is. However, we have met with a very determined group of businessmen who want to turn it over for a profit and evict the Fanny Bay Senior Society OAP #127.

This creates a huge dilemma for this senior's group about where to relocate. We really don't fit into the busy Fanny Bay Hall due to its large size and how many other community programs held there. The upstairs area is impossible to utilize because of the challenge of stairs for people with mobility problems. The dining room too small to seat everyone for our potlucks, the large hall is too big. The OAP has always been our 'Goldilocks' location.

Our Hall is home base for the Fanny Bay Quilt Group. For twenty-five years we have provided storage space for them to keep bins of fabric, rolls of batting and other equipment at the hall. This collection of supplies is used by the quilters to make 'Comfort Quilts' for a variety of vulnerable people in the community and elsewhere who are in need of a special quilt, close to 330 quilts so far, and counting. The Quilters will now be looking to relocate into another venue, but where?

The Art Mates meet on Wednesday afternoons to share their knowledge and techniques with each other and enjoy the company of other talented painters. They are a small group and again they would have a difficult time to relocate.

The <u>Baynes Sound Lions Club</u> International have met there on Monday evenings for years providing them with a gathering place to plan their many charitable programs. Being a Lion means 'knowing that kindness matters. They will need a new base, but where?

The Baynes Sound Garden Club enjoys

MLA Report: BC Budget 2024

B.C. is a great place to live and people want to put down roots and raise a family here. We have one of the lowest unemployment rates in Canada, and we're a leader in growing jobs and wages for working people. While we are an economic leader, people are facing big challenges - high interest rates, inflation, and a slower global economy.

Some say we should respond to these challenges by leaving people to fend for themselves and making deep cuts in the name of reducing the deficit. But people can't afford that.

If there's anything the last few years have taught us, it's that going it alone doesn't work. The choices we've made in our new budget will support people through tough times.

By working together, we can keep building on B.C.'s strong foundation so people can build a good life here for themselves and their families.



Action on Housing

Increasing the threshold for the First Time Home Buyers program.

New B.C. home flipping tax to take further action on speculation that drives up home prices.

Increasing the threshold of the Newly Built Home Exemption to \$1.1M - to incentivize more new home building.

\$950 million invested into BC Builds - a new program to leverage underused land, faster development, low-interest construction financing and grants to increase housing options for middleincome people and families.

Helping people with everyday costs

Increases to the BC Climate Action Tax Credit and the BC Family Beneifit.

New BC Electricity Affordability Credit.

Doubling the exemption threshold of the Employer Health Tax, from \$500k to \$1 million.

Improving Health Care in B.C.

Budget 2024 provides more than \$2 billion in funding to support people's access to the full range of health services, including primary and acute care, long-term care, assisted living, home care, and mental-health and substance-use care, and recruitment and retention of health-care professionals.

Capital investments of \$13 billion over the next three years will support construction of more long-term care, acute care and cancer care facilities.

ARCH IS THE MONTH

people keep telling you to wait five minutes for different weather. Not better weather, just different. So, between rainstorms, snow warnings and "boy, its warm for March" sunshine, there's time for us to make progress on the multiple projects, ongoing efforts, and future plans we have here at Fanny Bay Salmonid Enhancement Society.

In our incubation department, stacked trays full of eggs soaking up accumulated temperature units toward hatching as alevins get careful observation until the day the judgement call is made that they are ready for ponding. Then trays are poured into ponding nets, wooden frames floating in our large incubation room tanks, which are transition places for fry to leave behind within days for the wild blue yonder of the 2.43 x .91 meter (8 foot by 3 foot) tanks.

Coming soon is **The River Never Sleeps Festival, Sunday May 5th** this year, which is one big day of excitement for all of us and you, preceded by many days of preparation, planning and perspiration, because we are true believers in all three, plus alliteration. The smooth delivery of the event is the result of years of practice, and you are the ones we want to be

here for the performance. Mark your calendar, enter it in your phone's memory, book it off, save the day, plan to be with us.

Our small stream mapping project



has hit a few snags and none of them were natural, as in from nature, or on the job, but everyday human problems, like flu, a bad back, and a broken arm. No names needed, and it was just one per person, but Randy, Rosemary and Katie will be back at it when they're feeling better. Katie Shulze, junior biologist with Weaver Technical of Courtenay, FBSES' contractors, has been working with two of our members who are the backup positions on her stream work.

Rosemary Sparham is a safety person,

and Randy Lousier is doing in -stream notetaking and support. "Ground-truthing" as it is known, is the job of going out and finding if the geography fits the maps, and it often needs some adjustments, done today with GPS readings direct to a tablet. Our members are there because Katie has the expertise to do the job, but not alone. Volunteer assistance stretches our budget,

a big part of which is our own money, and a grant from the Pacific Salmon Foundation.

Randy says he "quite enjoyed" his day in the creek, taking notes on paper to supplement



the electronic stuff on essentials like wetlands, stream channel widths, tributaries, and ditches. Rosemary did her observing from the roads, watching Katie's locations via a GPS tracker on her, and measuring culverts, in a role called safety support. She says it's a "really good experience," and both are waiting for better health and the next stream on the list.

And we need to say goodbye to another long time and faithful friend of salmon and FBSES, Ross Radford, who was a long time neighbour and friend of many in Fanny Bay. Ross spent 10 years as a director and manager at the Society. His death at Glacier View in December 2023 was peaceful. Neighbour and friend of many in Fanny Bay.


All money received by the

The 2024 SPID parcel tax and water tolls invoices were mailed out at the end of January and are due at the office by March 31st, 2024. If you haven't received your invoice, please contact the SPID office at shipspt1@shaw.ca. Payments can be made in the form of cheque (postdated is OK), money order, certified cheque, bank draft and E-Transfer. To send an E-Transfer:

- 1. Add SPID as a recipient to your bank/ credit union account
- 2. Email payment to shipspt1@shaw.ca. (SPID is set up for automatic deposit so a password is not required)
- 3. In the message box, enter your roll #, invoice #, or street address. Payments received after March 31st will incur 15% late fees.

UTILITY PAYMENT:

SPID is listed as a Utility Payee with B.C. credit unions and Canada Western Bank. For those of you with an account at one of these institutions, you can pay using your account's Bill Payment option. The payee is Ships Point Improvement District, and the account number is your 3digit roll # prefaced by the word 'roll' (i.e. ROLLXXX or rollxxx) SPID.

the use of the hall once a month, it's the perfect size, the price is right! Where will they go?

Casual renters for birthday parties, small memorial gatherings, fabric sales, quilters retreats, potluck dinners, seminars, educational programs, Easter egg painting, training sessions etc, will have to look outside of the community to find a suitable venue with an affordable rate, but where?

The bottom line is that if the OAP Hall is gone, a partic -uarly important aspect of this rural community will disappear leaving a void which is impossible to fill. It directly impacts the over 70 Fanny Bay Seniors Society members and indirectly affects many hundreds more casual hall users.

Thank you all for writing emails to the Anglican Church in an attempt to support our cause. We will continue to work to save the hall. Please continue to draft emails to the church, directed to Brendon Neilson

Perhaps they will become more like our 'Lions'.

We have asked The CVRD to purchase the property in order to keep ownership where it belongs, in the possession of the community and lease it back to the Fanny Bay Senior Society. 

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FEBRUARY SEES SIGNIFICANT SALES INCREASE

Last month, 254 single-family homes sold in the Vancouver Island Real Estate Board (VIREB) area, up 15 per cent from one year ago and 67 per cent from January 2024. Sales of condo apartments in February came in at 68, increasing by 11 per cent year over year and up 45 per cent from the previous month. In Row/townhouse category, 59 units changed hands last month, an increase of 18 per cent from one year ago and up 48 per cent from January.

The Comox Valley's year-over-year benchmark price rose by six per cent to \$829,500.





Carrot Casserole

A Delicious and Sweet Side for Your Easter Meal.

Carrot season starts in March, coinciding with the celebration of Easter this year. Try making this mouthwatering sweet carrot side dish to complement your holiday spread. It pairs perfectly served alongside a savoury main like Ham or Lamb.

1 kg carrots, washed well and chopped

1/2 cup of melted butter

1 cup white sugar

1/4 cup of flour

1/2 tsp salt

1 heaped tsp baking powder

1 tsp vanilla

3 eggs, whisked

Boil carrots in water until soft. Drain, then mash carrots. (I use my stand mixer for this). Add in the rest of the ingredients, mixing well. Pour into a greased casserole dish, bake at 350F for about 45 min - 1 hour, until the middle is firm. This also presents well in individual "mini" cocottes.
