We respectfully acknowledge that the land we gather on is on the traditional unceded territory of the K'omoks First Nation, the traditional keepers of this land.

TO ALL FANNY BAY COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (FBCA) MEMBERS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN of a FBCA board resolution duly passed at a Board meeting on March 21, 2024, to be presented to the membership for consideration at the 2024 annual general meeting to be held May 16, 2024 at 5:30 pm at the Fanny Bay Community Hall.

Rationale: Audits are not a requirement under the BC Societies Act, yet our current Bylaws require them. The Board feels it is time to rescind this costly requirement.

Since the Constitution and Bylaws are the official governing documents of the FBCA, amendments to them must be approved via special resolution at the Annual General Meeting. The Board is therefore requesting the membership vote on the following:

SPECIAL RESOLUTION: REMOVAL OF BYLAW PART 9 – AUDITOR, and ADDITION OF WORDING RELATED TO REVIEWS OF FINANCIAL RECORDS

WHEREAS the FBCA Board recommends that the resolution below be passed as a special resolution at the 2024 Annual General Meeting,

BE IT RESOLVED AS A SPECIAL RESOLUTION that Bylaw Part 9 – Auditor be removed in its entirety, and replaced with a new bylaw inserted under Part 8 – Finances and Signing Authority, to read:

At the discretion of a simple majority of Directors, the Board may be requested to engage an accountant to complete either a Compilation, Review, or Audit of the Association's financial records. The results of such an engagement must be reported to the full Board and to the membership at the next AGM.

Per Bylaw 3.2.1, if the Board receives a written request signed by 10% of the members of the Association requesting the Board engage an accountant to complete either a Compilation, Review, or Audit of the Association's financial records, the Board must comply by holding a general meeting to address the issue, and take all relevant steps set out by the members at that meeting.

Be it further resolved that references to audits in Bylaws 1.1 "annual general meeting", 3.1.3, and 8.3b be removed, and that "or appointing auditors" be added at the end of the definition of "special resolution" in Bylaw 1.1.



NOTE: Persons considering standing for election to the FBCA Board of Directors can download the Expression of Interest form from our website, along with other documents related to this important volunteer commitment. Forms must be received in writing by 25 April 2024.

PID ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING: The AGM will be held on **Thursday April 25, 2024 at 7:00 pm** at the Fanny Bay Community Hall. Doors will open at 6:30 pm for voter registration. If you are a Ships Point resident looking for an opportunity to

become more involved in your community, please consider volunteering as a trustee. No experience is required, and the Board is a friendly and supportive group. In the words of one of our current trustees, "As an improvement district, we have control over our own water and fire departments and the budgets for both. I'm proud to be a part of managing that." Nomination forms are available at the SPID office on Vivian Way and on the website at <u>SPID.ca</u> under General Info, Board of Trustees. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor at the AGM.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING: From **May 16 - 17th** you may notice our Water Operator flushing the main water lines and fire hydrants. Water main flushing is performed regularly to ensure continued safe, clean drinking water. The line flushing may cause some cloudiness in the water. With this in mind, you mayconsider doing laundry at another time. If cloudiness occurs, please run the outside tap nearest to the road until it clears.

<u>BURN PERMITS REQUIRED</u>: Effective **April 15th**, permits are required for yard waste burning AND for campfires in non-approved commercial and homemade fire pits. To obtain a burning permit, download and complete a form and take it to a member of the SPID Fire Department for approval and signature. Before burning, please ensure the Venting Index is rated GOOD. Forms and Venting Index information are available on the SPID website at <u>SPID.ca</u>. Please note that beach fires are NOT allowed anywhere or at anytime on Ships Point.

<u>SPVFA CHIPPING EVENT</u>: The Ships Point Volunteer Firefighters Association Spring chipping event will be held over the weekend of **May 4th**. Registration is not required. Collect your fallen branches to be chipped at the roadside: - Clean brush only, branches I/2 inch to 4 inches in diameter, no smaller or larger, foliage does not need to be removed -

NO BLACKBERRIES, NO RAKED MATERIAL (to avoid stones injuring crews or damaging machinery). Stack material parallel to the street, butt ends facing the same direction. PLEASE NOTE: This program is run by community volunteers and is not meant

the street, butt ends facing the same direction. PLEASE NOTE: This program is run by community volunteers and is not meant to replace commercial large-scale chipping required when large trees are cut down. Please hire a commercial chipper for whole tree limb chipping.

All chips will be hauled away. Please contact Bill Trussler at 403-880-5619 if you are in doubt about the amount of chipping you wish to have done. Residents CANNOT help at the roadside. Donations are appreciated and can be made at any time leading up to the event. E transfer is available as a payment method to **spvfirefightersassociation@gmail.com**. All money received by the Ships Point Volunteer Firefighters Association is used to replace outdated equipment, provide training for fire fighters and first responders, and for emergency preparedness.

ELP SAVE OUR HALL GOFUNDME CAMPAIGN has been running for just a little over a month now and we have reached our goal PLUS! This response is beyond our wildest dreams!! Spring Is Here!! This publication will be going to press just before the next Bank of Canada Rate Announcement, with many predicting we will see a decrease in interest rates in June. On a local level, we have seen an increase in buyer activity over the last couple of weeks. Last month, VIREB (Vancouver Island Real Estate Board) recorded 655 unit sales board-wide (all property types). In the single-family category (not acreage or waterfront), 291 homes were sold in March, down 22 percent from one year ago and up 15 percent from February 2024 March, an increase of 9 percent from one year ago and up 39 percent from February. The number of active listings of single-family homes was 1,084 in March, up from 963 the previous year. The Comox Valley's year-over-year benchmark price rose by 10 percent to \$856,300

We have been doing our open house event for a while now - since 2008, with a couple of missing years for that COVID inconvenience. And each year we've tried to make it better. This year, there will be more booths and seeing how we fit them in will be part of the excitement. There will be more and better stuff that you loved last year - like ice cream cones, French fries, oysters and popcorn.

Our beloved smolt release routine will be back, renewing everyone's favourite memory of carrying a shiny Coho smolt down to Rosewall Creek sending it on its way to the Pacific Ocean.

Our open house, <u>The River Never Sleeps</u> will be **Sunday**, **May 5th** this year, 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. with *free admission* you can enjoy all the goodies and thrills we have to offer. FBSES and RNS will be where it's always been, 8425 Berray Road in Fanny Bay, with lots of roadside parking and at the lot at

Natural Glacial Waters plant. Lovely surroundings, live music, fish, and friends. Drop in, meet us, and have a nice day on the hatchery site with family and friends. You want to be there.

We have been busy with other things too. Thousands (about 60,000) of little Chum fry are now released and even more thousands of Coho alevins (freshly hatched eggs) are now growing in our tanks, becoming real fish after leaving their incubation trays. Water problems are predictable this year, and we already know what we're going to do to keep our fish happy and wet, if it happens.

The eggs at Beachcombers Academy in Fanny Bay that we told you about last month came back to be released as fry. Their kindergarten to grade four class did a tour of the hatchery and charmed us all. Also the season for the wild fish of our area to take themselves into the estuaries and then the saltchuck, which means it is smolt box season. They are the overnight stopping places for stream life that gets collected for identification and counting and they are on Chef, Mud Bay, and Wilfred creeks



this year, with Cook Creek's population being collected in traps before being released. The counts we produce annually show the productivity of our area as a salmon and trout nursery, as well as the kind of fluctuations that nature create - those water flows again. As always, if you'd like to be part of what we do, we welcome you every Wednesday and Saturday morning at the hatchery site.

T HE BENEFITS OF RETAINING MATURE TREES

Summer is approaching and in our 'new normal' that brings worries about drought and wildfire risk. The role of trees in climate change mitigation and fire risk can seem at odds. In 2018 the FBCA, Baynes Sound Garden Club, and Beaufort Watershed Stewards sponsored a town hall with a Certified Arborist, a Hydrogeologist, and a Registered Professional Technologist. They reviewed the scientific evidence that underscores the value of mature trees in the landscape. Six years later this information is just as relevant.

This article reviews the arborist information with additional notes added by Verna Mumby, of Mumby's Arboriculture Consulting. She highlights four key points regarding the retention of mature trees in the landscape: the overall benefits of trees, valuation of trees, how trees work together and retaining large trees.



A key benefit of mature trees is that they capture and store carbon. For example, in one year an average tree inhales 26 pounds of carbon dioxide - as much as a car emits in an 11,000-mile trip! Trees purify the air by removing pollutants such as carbon monoxide, sulfur dioxide and nitrogen dioxide. A mature tree can produce as much oxygen in one season as ten people inhale in one year. Mature trees also provide storm

water benefits by intercepting rainwater, mitigate flooding and replenishing groundwater. Shade and cooler ambient temperature helps retain water in groundcover and surface soil.

The monetary value of large trees may not be considered by homeowners. You may be surprised to know that large trees on your property can add from 3 to 15% to the value of your home. For homeowners with trees, summer energy costs can be up to 14% less, thanks to the shade that large trees provide.

The interdependence of trees is a more recent discovery. Trees work together in groups as they support and protect one another. These processes also enable trees to secure and protect the foreshore making them critical for maintaining waterfront embankments. This is why the Comox Valley Regional District bylaw restricts tree work withing 30 meters of high tide or a stream. Studies have shown that the roots of veteran trees can use from 40 to 60% of photosynthetic by-products to exude nutrients into the soil thus enriching the environment for undergrowth and future trees. This synergy is a hallmark of healthy ecosystems, including healthy home properties. "Limbing up" or the removal of the lowest branches on mature trees, especially cedars, will cause the roots to dry out faster as will removal of the natural debris (duff) from around the base of your trees. With climate change, mature trees are struggling during droughts and these actions are detrimental to their survival.

Wildfire prevention programs offer advice concerning wild

fires in the wildland urban interface, often the removal of trees and duff. BALANCE is needed when considering the benefits and risks in an ecosystem. How much will removal of debris from a yard negatively impact the large trees? How much shrubbery and ground cover can be removed without killing trees? Each property is unique, and optimal ecological solutions will vary.

How will your actions affect the local ecology and the mature trees; one of the best ways to fight climate change?



REACHCOMBERS EDUCATION SOCIETY

is pleased to announce that it has been awarded nearly \$2,025,000 from the ChildCareBC New Spaces Fund to expand the Little Oysters Child Care. The fund is jointly supported by provincial investments and federal funding provided under the 2021-2022 to 2025-2026 Canada-British Columbia Canadawide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement. The nonprofit, which operates Beachcombers Academy and Little Oysters Childcare will be more than tripling its child care capacity, adding 36 spots for a total capacity of 52 child care spots, as well as adding capacity for 16 group multi-age care spots.

"We are thrilled," says Little Oysters Child Care Manager Kathy Fredrikson. "In recent years, we have had parents in tears when there was not a spot available for their child. We operate a nature-inspired enriched pre-kindergarten program that is very popular. We are operating at capacity again this year."

Beachcombers Academy and Little Oysters Child Care was started in 2010 by educators and Fanny Bay families, following the closure of the Union Bay school, in order to provide a local school in Fanny Bay and an enriched program option for Comox Valley families. They offer a nature-inspired academic program that meets and exceeds the BC curriculum.

The school has received multiple commendations from Ministry of Education inspectors. "One of our inspectors sat on the Provincial committee for the new BC Curriculum that was implemented in 2015; he used Beachcombers was used a model of what was possible in primary education. We are immensely proud of the quality program that we provide," said Zoe Lambert, Beachcombers Education Society President.

The BC government, with support from the federal government, has put a focus on improving access to affordable child care in the Province through increasing child care spaces using the New Spaces Fund and reducing fees to parents through the Child Care Fee Reduction Initiative (CCFRI). "As a facility participating in the CCFRI, we have been able to reduce fees to parents by 30% in the past two years. This has been a huge help to parents. We are already seeing a real benefit to children and families as a result of this government initiative," said Lambert.

The Little Oysters Child Care expansion is in early stages, with most of the work planned to be completed September 2025. "This is an ambitious project, and while it sounds like a sizable budget, we are doing a lot within a tight budget," says Lambert. Beachcombers Education Society also contributing an additional \$225,000 to the project which is a stipulation of the funding. "It will be a beautiful space for children, with ocean views in our lovely location. We are excited!"

"This expanded child care space is a much-needed support for families in the Comox Valley and North Qualicum communities," said Mitzi Dean, Provincial Minister of State for Child Care. "With reliable child care, working families can feel secure, while also strengthening the local economy. It's a win for families and the whole community."

"The opportunity for Little Oysters Child Care to expand their facility is a victory in so many ways. These new spaces will make a significant difference for families in the community and provide an enriching environment for their children to play, learn, and grow," said Jenna Sudds, Federal Minister of Families, Children and Social Development. "Today's announcement is an excellent example of our united effort to provide access to high-quality and inclusive regulated child care while also providing parents with significant savings."

The Little Oysters Child Care is now accepting registration. "We have only a couple of the current child care spaces available for the 2024-2025 school year, but we will be waitlisting students, and will be able to accommodate more families when the expansion is completed. We encourage interested families to register early," says Fredrickson. For more information about the Little Oysters Child Care see their website at **BeachcombersSchool.ca**.

It's officially spring, buds are bursting forth, new growth is expanding, and everything is turning green. In the spirit of spring, BWS is expanding as well. Not satisfied with sampling just thirteen creeks, we are bursting forth into Bowser.

The last time we expanded, we created two separate sampling teams, which we christened the North Pod (Buckley Bay to Royston) and the South Pod (Buckley Bay to Mud Bay). But our new Bowser creeks will be to the south of our South Pod. What to name it?! We toyed with the idea of having a North Pod, a South Pod, and a Mother Pod, but we opted to switch to more geographically useful names: the Royston Pod, the Fanny Bay Pod, and now the Bowser Pod.



Rhubarb Muffins

Rhubarb is one of the first crops ready for harvest in April/May here on Vancouver island. With a second harvest in June, it is a prolific grower. These muffins are a delicious way to enjoy some of it. Make sure to use the thinner more tender stalks when baking with rhubarb, and discard all leaves.

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup of melted butter
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup flour •
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp each baking soda, baking powder & salt
- 1 cup finely chopped rhubarb
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts Topping
- 1 TB brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp cinnamon

Mix together the butter, buttermilk, egg & vanilla. In another bowl whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder, soda & salt. Add the nuts & rhubarb to the dry ingredients. Toss to coat with flour. Add the wet ingredients to the dry, stir until just mixed.

Fill greased muffin liners in a muffin baking tray. Mix the topping ingredients and sprinkle over top. Bake at 375F (or convect at 350F) for 20-25 minutes. They are done when they bounce back after touching.
